The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS Day the Most Reverend Father in God John Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and the Right Honourable Robert Earl of Northington, were, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took their Places at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to declare the Right Honourable Robert Earl of Northington Lieutenant-General and General Governor of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland.

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 16th of February, 1781, to direct, That all Ships and Vessels then arrived, or that might thereafter arrive, from Dantzick, or any other Port or Place in Royal or Ducal Prussia or Pomerania, or from any other Port or Place in Courland, Samogitia, or Livonia, should be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings, without unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, provided they should have no Goods or Merchandize on Board, the Produce of Turkey or the Levant, which might subject them to the Rules of Quarantine, under the Directions contained in His Majesty's Order in Council bearing Date the 20th of September then last; that they brought with them clean Bills of Health; and that the Master or other Person taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel did first make Oath before the Custom-House Officer or Chief Magistrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they were bound to, that the Crews were free from all Infection: And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that several Ships and Vessels are expected to arrive from the said Ports and Places without Bills of Health, and will thereby become subject to the Rules of Quarantine, to the great Loss and Detriment of the Owners; His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that all Ships and Vessels arriving from any of the said Ports or Places be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings, without unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, notwithstanding they shall omit to bring a clean Bill of Health; provided they have no Goods or Merchandize on Board the Produce of Turkey or the Levant.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of

His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions hereín, as to them may respectively appertain.
