P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, by an Act of Parliament passed this Session, intituled, "An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America, and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That during the Continuance of the said Act, it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to give such Directions and to make such Regulations with respect to Duties, Drawbacks or otherwise, for carrying on the Trade and Commerce between the People and Territories belonging to the Crown of Great Britain, and the People and Territories of the said United States, as to His Majesty in Council shall appear most expedient and salutary, any Law, Usage or Custom to the contrary notwithstanding: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and direct, That any Oil, or any unmanufactured Goods or Merchandizes, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the said United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British or American Ships, by British Subjects, or by any of the People inhabiting in and belonging to the said United States, or any of them; and such Goods or Merchandize shall and may be entered and landed in any Port in this Kingdom, upon Payment of the same Duties as the like Sort of Goods or Merchandize are or may be subject and liable to, if imported by British Subjects in British Ships from any British Island or Plantation in America, and no other, notwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the same may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law: And it is hereby further ordered and directed, That there shall be the same Drawbacks, Exemptions, and Bounties on Merchandizes and Goods exported from Great Britain into the Territories of the said United States of America, or any of them, as are allowed upon the Exportation of the like Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America. And it is hereby farther ordered and directed, That all American Ships and Vessels which shall have voluntarily come into any Port of Great Britain since the 20th of January, 1783, shall be admitted to an Entry, and, after such Entry made, shall be intituled, together with the Goods and Merchandizes on Board the same Ships and Vessels, to the full Benefit of this Order.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of

the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to pass the Great Seal, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Norwich to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the Death of the Right Reverend Doctor Philip Yonge, late Bishop thereof; and His Majesty has also been pleased, by His Royal Sign Manual, to recommend to the said Dean and Chapter the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor Lewis Bagot, now Bishop of Bristol, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Norwich.

The King has been pleased to appoint John Murray, Esq; to be One of the Commissioners, in Quality of a Principal Officer of His Majesty's Navy.

Berlin, May 3. Yesterday the King of Prussia arrived at Charlottenburg, a German Mile from Berlin, and this Morning reviewed several Regiments of Infantry that are quartered here. Tomorrow his Majesty is to review all the Regiments of Cavalry. The Manœuvres by the whole Garrison of Berlin, and of the Environs, will commence the 20th Instant.

HIS late Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th Day of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinfales; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Mr. Thomas Kite, at the Admiralty-Office, who will send them all necessary Information.

And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of Sea-Officers who died before the 30th of August, 1732, as well as to the Widows of those who died since that Time, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, such Monies as may be due to them, on the 31st of May instant; This is to give Notice, that any Widows who have not yet applied, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible; and that all such Widows, whose Claims have been already allowed, may send or bring to this Office, as soon as possible, the Affidavits required by the Rules, in order to their being continued upon the Pension or Bounty.
