Naples, Sept. 29.

Rom Sicily we tretted, that the Officers of their Marine refuse to obey the Marquis deVillasiel, who is lately made General of the Gallies, notwithstan ing the express Orders from the Court at Madrid; to prevent the prejudice this may bring upon the Kings assairs, our Viceroy is sending thither the Marquis de Bayonne, to take upon him the command of General of the Gallies pra interim, till the King's farther pleasure be known. Letters have been written hither from the Court of Spain to the Bishops of this Kingdom, to exhort them to contribute to the expences of the War of Sicily.

Warfam, Octob. 1. The 28 past we received Letters from Bialacerhieu of the 13 of the same month, which give this account, That General Romadanowski advancing with an Army of 100 000 men, as well Moscovites as Cossacks, encamped at Wisla between Fast and the Niefter, about four Leagues from Gzecherin, which the Turks belieged, and which had already relisted five several affaults, the Turks and Tartars who likewise made about 100 000 men, under the command of Zaitan Bassa, thereupon drew off from the Siege. The next day the two Armies engaged in a Battel, which was fought with great courage and obstinacy, and with great flanghter of men on both files; to that it was hard to fay who had the better, fave that the Mofcovites relieved Czecherin. But these Letters being of somewhat an old date, we know not fill what to believe of the reports that go about, that the Turks have finally made them clives Matters of Czecherin, putting all the Gari-fon to the Sword. We have several advices from Riga, which i y that the Suedes Army was ready to march; but that has been fo often faid, that in Pruffia the people begin to lose the apprehensions they had of that

Gopenhagen, Oslob. 16. This morning Admiral Fuels is come with 14 Men of Wanto the Soundt, being forced to come home through want of Provisions, which when they have taken in, at least the lightest ships will put to Sea again, and go and block up Gottenburg. In Schonen nothing of moment passes, the Suedes b'ocking up Christianstade. The Heer Klingenberg is parted hence for Bremen, to assist there on the part of our King at the Conferences to be held for the division of the Conquests in Bremen.

From the Cump before Stetin, Octob. 18. This day feveral Deferters are come out of the Town, and tell us, that time of the principal Burghers finding they cannot expect to be relieved, and that they must at last fall into the hinds of the Elector of Brandenburg, think it better to make good Conditions for themselves, by an early Surrender, than to expose themselves to the last extremity, so that we hope now to see a sudden end of this Sieges and the rather, for that we are come to the very walls of the Town. His Electoral Highn is received advice yesterday, that the Count of Coning mark, upon the King of Deamarks return to the life of Rugen, had quite ab indoned the same, except one Fort, in which he had lest a strong Garison.

Brifac, Octob. 22. The Armies were encamped for feveral dayes to near each other, that it was thought neither could decamp without giving the other an opportunity to attack their Rear; but on the 19 inflant the Mareschal de Grequi quitted his quarters at Kochesherg, and marched to Ma'sheim, the Imperialists not going about
