Naples, Sept. 29.

From Sicily we are told, that the Officers of the Marine refuse to obey the Marquis de Villafiel, who is lately made General of the Gallies, notwithstanding the express Orders from the Court at Madrid; to prevent the prejudice this may bring upon the Kings affairs, our Viceroy is sending thither the Marquis de Bayonne, to take upon him the command of General of the Gallies *pro interim*, till the King's farther pleasure be known. Letters have been written hither from the Court of Spain to the Bishops of this Kingdom, to exhort them to contribute to the expences of the War of Sicily.

Warsaw, Octob. 1. The 28 past we received Letters from *Bialacerkieu* of the 13 of the same month, which give this account, That General *Romanowski* advancing with an Army of 100 000 men, as well *Moscovites* as *Cossacks*, encamped at *Wisla* between *Fassi* and the *Niester*, about four Leagues from *Czecherin*, which the *Turks* besieged, and which had already resisted five several assaults, the *Turks* and *Tartars* who likewise made about 100 000 men, under the command of *Zaitan* Bassa, thereupon drew off from the Siege. The next day the two Armies engaged in a Battel, which was fought with great courage and oblinacy, and with great slaughter of men on both sides, so that it was hard to say who had the better, save that the *Moscovites* relieved *Czecherin*. But these Letters being of somewhat an old date, we know not till what to believe of the reports that go about, that the *Turks* have finally made themselves Masters of *Czecherin*, putting all the Garrison to the Sword. We have several advices from *Riga*, which say that the *Suedes* Army was ready to march; but that has been so often said, that in *Prussia* the people begin to lose the apprehensions they had of that march.

Copenhagen, Octob. 16. This morning Admiral *Fuels* is come with 14 Men of War into the Sound, being forced to come home through want of Provisions, which when they have taken in, at least the lightest ships will put to Sea again, and go and block up *Gottenburg*. In *Schonon* nothing of moment passes, the *Suedes* blockading up *Christianstadt*. The Heer *Klingenberg* is parted hence for *Bremen*, to assist there on the part of our King at the Conferences to be held for the division of the Conquests in *Bremen*.

From the Camp before Stetin, Octob. 18. This day several Deserters are come out of the Town, and tell us, that some of the principal Burghers finding they cannot expect to be relieved, and that they must at last fall into the hands of the Elector of *Brandenburg*, think it better to make good Conditions for themselves, by an early Surrender, than to expose themselves to the last extremity, so that we hope now to see a sudden end of this Siege; and the rather, for that we are come to the very walls of the Town. His Electoral Highness received advice yesterday, that the Count of *Coningsmark*, upon the King of *Denmarks* return to the Isle of *Rugen*, had quite abandoned the same, except one Fort, in which he had left a strong Garrison.

Brisac, Octob. 22. The Armies were encamped for several dayes so near each other, that it was thought neither could decamp without giving the other an opportunity to attack their Rear; but on the 19 instant the *Maréchal de Crequi* quitted his quarters at *Kochesberg*, and marched to *Mosheim*, the Imperialists not going about
