ly for men for the Emperor, the Bishop of Ofnabrug, and the Bishop of Muniter, but they come in very flowly. The Duke of Neuburg has likewife given out Commissions for the raising of men. There are Letters from Hungary, which say that Gopo Poles were matching towards Moneaz and that General Cop was forming a Body of 8000 men to make head against them.

Bruffels, Oftob. 29. Our Armies continue encamped as we fold you in our last, though it's fai for cer ain that they will beak up on Monday or Tuefday next, by which time the last Convoy that wis fent to Namur will be returned. In the interim feveral Troops have been fent from the Army to their Winter qu mers. Major General Webbenum is marched with a confi erable Bowy towards Haffelt, and it's faid is appointed to command the Confederate Troops that were pelled this Summer about Maefiricht, and are now difperted into Winterquarters, Major General Space having defired his Excellency to ease him of that charge, by reason of an in disposition he lies at presen under. Hi Excellency had alotted Winter quarters for the Munfter as well as the other Confederate Troops in thele Provinces, that fo they may be ready at hand to oppose the defigns of the Enemy, who, we are affured, will begin the Campigne very early; but the faid Munfter Troops pietend not to be content with the quarters alorted them, and are refolved to return to Germany, and to winter in Wetteravia; norwichlanding all the endeavors used by his Excellency to diffuade them from it, as from a thing that will on their part break the measures that have been taken by his Excellency for the fecurity of these Coun-Yester lay the Prince of Oranges Regiment of tries, Four Guards paffed through this City, in order to their embark ng for Holland; and the fame day three Dutch Regiments arrived hereby water from Ipres, who are to winter here, and Lieutenant General Alua is come hither, to fee that the necessary provision be made for them. The Duke of Holflein, Coun Egmont, and many other of our principal Officers are come hicher from the Army. Our Letters from Strasburg of the 22 tell us, that the Baggage of the Duke of Saxe-Eyfenach had repassed the Rhine, but that the Troops he had commanced this Summer viz. thole of Mentz, Heffen, O's. were marched towards the Saar, to observe the detachment fent that way under the conduct of the Mara quis de Rannes. The Letters add, that the French decamped the 19 inftant fo filently from Kochersberg, that the Imperialtits had no opportunity to attack their Rear; General Dunewaldt was fent out with 2000 Horfesbat refurned without attempting any thing. The 22 the Imperial Army decamped from Mettelhaufen, but upon what defign was not known. The Sieur de Monclar had paffed the Rhine at Brifac with a confiderable Bddy. From Liege they write, that the French are prowiding grear Magazines at Sedan, Charleville, Dinant, Philipville 28c. All the French Troops are drawn into their Winter-quarters within the New Conquelts.

There is much talk of Peace, but at the fame time the preparations for the War go on.
