IRISH LIFE ANNUITIES,

With Benefit of Survivorship.

THE Subscribers to the Life Annuities, which commenced the 25th of March, 1778, according to a Resolution of the House of Commons of Ireland, Session 1777, and provided for by an Act of Parliament, Session 1779, may receive Six Months Annuity, due at Midsummer last, at Messrs. Boldero, Kendall, Adey, and Co. Bankers, No. 77, in Lombard-street, in the following Manner, viz.

The First Class in each, (consisting of Nominees of the Age of Forty Years and upwards) from the 29th Instant to the 1st of August, both Days inclusive, from Ten in the Forenoon till Two in the Afternoon.

The Second Class in each, (consisting of Nominees of the Age of Twenty Years and upwards, but under Forty) from the 5th of August to the 8th Ditto, both Days inclusive.
