Tangier, Septemb. 22.

**W**E learn from a good hand, that in the Turks Man of War that was engaged lately with the *Saphire* Frigate, not only the Captain, but above sixty Men were killed, besides wounded. Three days since Sir *John Narborough* gave Chace off of *Tarista* to five Turks Men of War, but being very clean (not having been at Sea above five or six days) they all escaped. The Work of the Mole here is carried on with great success.

*Madrid, Octob. 21.* On the last of *September* the King went to the *Escorial*, and will continue there till *All Saints* day, his Majesty entertaining himself chiefly in hunting. The *Marquis de Montecat* since his being removed from the Presidentship of the Council of State, has notwithstanding frequently appeared in the said Council. The *Constable of Colarna* Duke of *Tallacozo* (a *Roman*, but by his Estate in *Naples* Subject to this Crown, and a *Grandee*) is made *Viceroy of Aragon*. The *Conde de Monsercy* is recalled from *Catalonia*, and is made *President of the Council of Flanders* in the room of the *Prince of Stigliano*, who is in disfavor at Court. The *Conde d'Ernanuz* General of the *Artillery in Sicily*, is lately arrived here from thence, and hath given an account of the ill posture the affairs of that Kingdom are in. The *Conde de Bunos*, one of the first Nobility in this Kingdom, aged about 75 years, sometime *Viceroy of New Spain*, having about a year ago put himself into the Order of the *Barefooted Carmelite Friars*, and having passed his *Noviceship*, he Celebrated *High Mass* in the presence of all the Nobility and Persons of Quality of this Court, who had been invited to assist at the Solemnity. We have advice from *Tangier*, that on the 8th instant some of the English Frigats gave Chace to an Algerine Man of War called the *Golden Horse*, of 36 Guns, and 265 Men, commanded by *Hans Raiz* a Dutch Renegade officer, and came up with him; the Turk defended himself pretty well, but having received several broad sides, was taken by one of the said Frigats; The Turkish Captain was found slain with about 100 men (many of which were killed by the Captains own hand for offering to yield.) In this action Captain *Canning* Commander of the *James* Frigate, was unhappily killed by a Musket bullet.

*Dantzicke, Octob. 16.* The King of *Poland* has made the *Bishop of Warmia*, *Vice-Chancellor* of the Crown, *Archbishop of Gnesna*; and at the same time the Charge of *Vice-Chancellor* his Majesty disposed of to the *Bishop of Suseori*. We do not as yet hear any thing of the march of the *Suedes Army in Livonia*; so that the *Besieged in Stetin* must not expect any Relief from thence. The Letters we receive from *Leopold* dated the first instant, do not only confirm the news we had of a Victory obtained by the *Moscovites* over the *Turks*, but add, that the latter had been forced to raise the Siege of *Czeczrim*, and had repassed the *Niester*; their Gene-

ral *Zeitau* Bassa having sent to *Sierko* General of the *Cossacks*, to press him to join with the Forces of the *Grand Signior*.

*Vienna, Octob. 17.* *Don Bernardo de Salinas* is arrived here in quality of *Envoy Extraordinary* from the *Governor of the Spanish Netherlands*. On Monday last his Imperial Majesty went to *Neustadt*, to give a Visit to his Sister the *Queen-Dowager of Poland*, whose marriage with the *Duke of Lorraine* will be consummated so soon as his Highness returns from the Army. Here are arrived *Deputies* from the *Magistrates of Strasbourg*, to sollicite a moderation of the Sum imposed upon them for *Winter-quarters*. The *Marquis de Grana* has received from *Spain* the Order of the *Golden Fleece*, and in a day or two will be performed the Ceremony of Investing him with it. From *Hungary* they write as if some thousand *Poles* were on their march to join with the *Malecontents*.

*Hamburg, Octob. 20.* They write from the Camp before *Stetin*, that on Friday night last the *Lunenburs* took a *Ravelin* without the loss of one Man, (the *Suedes* having it seems abandoned it) and that they are advanced with their Approaches to the Walls and *Palisades* of the Town; that some *Deserters* had assured his *Electoral Highness*, that the *Besieged* were resolved to surrender the Town, so soon as they should have certain advice that the *Isle of Rugen* should be lost; which as yet they would not believe, but did flatter themselves that the *Danes* were beaten off again, and that the *Lunenburs* were going to leave the Siege. Others write from thence, that the Siege goes on very slowly, chiefly occasioned by this ill weather they have had of late; that the Sickness in the Camp increases daily more and more, and that the *Soldiers* are put to hard duty. The Letters we expected this day from *Stralsund* are not yet arrived; but those from *Rostocke* tell us, that *Counth Coningsmarke* is posted with his Cavalry between *Branth* and *Stralsund*.

*Strasbourg, Octob. 28.* The *Duke of Lorraine*, after having sent a detachment under the command of *Major General Rabarow* cover the *Rolls* which the *Imperialists* are possessed of on the *Sare*; Decamped from *Mittelhausen*, through want of Forage, and went and encamped at *Buffenhausen*, nine Leagues from this City. His Highness has received from *Vienna* the Emperors final Orders concerning the distribution of the *Winter-quarters*.

*Ublongue, Octob. 29.* Our Advices from above tell us, that the *Duke of Lorraine* had sent the Troops of the *Circles* under the command of the *Comte de Rey* to attack *La Perle Pierre*, and that *Colonel de la Chaussee* was likewise marched that way with a detachment of *Imperial Troops*. By Passengers come hither from *Bonne* we are told, that several Officers of the *Marquis de Grana's* Regiment were apprehended, and that their Regiment was exposed, they very suddenly. We are told that 3000 *Imperialists* are appointed to winter in this Diocess, on pretence to secure it against the incursions of the *Garison of Macstricht*.

though the poor Inhabitants would be glad to run the hazard, so they might be freed from such Safeguards. Levies continue to be made in all these parts for our Electors, as well as for the Electors of Mentz, Treves, and other Princes of Germany.

**Brisac, Octob. 31.** The Marechal de Crequi decamping the 19 instant from Kocheberg, marched towards Suisdalsheim, at present the head-quarter is at Moltheim. The Marechal de Crequi has quartered his Cavalry in the neighbouring Villages for their better subsistence. The Duke of Lorraine is encamped at Pfaffenhouen; this day he takes a general Review of his Army, and it is expected the next news will be that he has repassed the Rhine. The Baron de Montlan has repassed the Rhine over the Bridge laid near this place. Major General Harant and Colonel Fournant, who were taken prisoners in the action which happened on the 7th instant, are still at Schlestadt, from whence it is said they will be removed to Nancy. The 19 instant Major General Berlippe and Major General Duncowals passed the Rhine at Stearbourg with their Regiments, to join the Imperial Army.

**Brussels, Novemb. 2.** Yesterday his Excellency, the Duke de Villa Hermosa accompanied with several of the principal Officers, returned hither from the Army, having dispersed the Troops into their several Winter-quarters. His Excellency has had great difficulty to content the Contented Troops, their Officers making very great demands, especially those of Munster, who being dissatisfied that their demands were not complied with, are marching towards Germany, intending to go and winter in Wetteravia; by which means the Osnabrug Troops have the quarters that were allotted the said Munsterians. The Duke of Montalto is preparing for his Voyage to Spain, in whose absence the Prince of Vandemon will be General of the Horse. The Duke of Holstein is gone home to his own Country, but intends to return before the beginning of the new Campaign. Count Waldatz is sending all the Dutch Troops into their Winter-quarters and will fix himself at Matines. The discourse at Court this afternoon was, that the French had attacked Sarbruck, which the Imperialists are fortifying; and that the Imperialists attack la prise de Sieve.

**Metz, Novemb. 2.** The Marquis de Ravines Lieutenant General; and the Marquis de Boufflers Marechal de Camp, are at present encamped with a detachment of their Army at St. Avaise; which several pieces of Cannon have been sent from thence. It is said they will besiege Sarbruck.

**Paris, Nov. 6.** From Rome our Letters give us an account, that the Pope was extremely dissatisfied with the Spanish Ambassador for having not only made Levies in the Ecclesiastical Territories contrary to the Popes express Order, but that several papers had been forcibly carried away, and great disorders committed. From Alsace they write of this first instant that the Marechal de Crequi continued encamped at Moltheim, having sent the Guards du Corps and the Gendarmes into their Winter-quarters, and that the Duke of Lorraine was encamped at Pfaffenhouen and Bouviller; that it was expected every day his Highness would decamp and repass the Rhine; that the Marechal de Crequi had caused all the Forage about Stearbourg to be destroyed, and that the people there had been in continual apprehension that our Troops would have attacked the Fort which guards their Bridge.

London, Octob. 29: This day, according to the annual Custom, Sir Francis Chaplin Kt. Their Majesties, accompanied with his Royal Highness, their Highnesses the Lady Mary and the Lady Anne, and his Highness the Prince of Orange, attended by a great many of the principal Nobility and other Persons of Quality, having been pleased upon the humble Invitation of the City to honor them with their Presence first at the Show in Cheapside, being placed in a Balcony under a canopy of State, at the House of Sir Edward Waldo, upon whom His Majesty was then pleased to confer the Honor of Knighthood, and afterwards at the Guildhall at Dinner, where the Entertainment was very noble and magnificent in all kinds.
