*Copenhagen, September 9.* Accounts are received from Iceland, of a violent Eruption having taken Place in that Island, upon the 8th of June. Several Villages have been destroyed, and a considerable Tract of Country is buried under immense Depths of Lava: The new Island also continues to emit great Quantities of Fire, and was still increasing when the last Ships came from thence.

Letters from Iceland, of the 24th of July, contain the most dismal Detail of the Devastations occasioned by the Course of the Lava, and affirm that the Eruptions continued even at that Date.

**W H E R E A S** the Dover Waggon was, on its Passage from Canterbury to London, on Wednesday the 20th Day of August last, about the Hour of Twelve at Noon, stopped near the Six Mile Stone on Blackheath, and the Waggoner, and one James Dray, Servant to Mr. Tankard, one of the Officers of the Customs, who accompanied him on Horseback, and having with him a led Horse, which he permitted the Waggoner to ride, were surrounded by divers Persons armed with Pistols, Clubs, and other offensive Weapons, to the Number of Ten, or thereabouts, who, by Force and Violence, took Possession of the Waggon, and compelled the Waggoner to drive the same out of the Publick Road, up a Private Lane near the Park Pales, and then and there feloniously took out of the said Waggon Two Wooden Cases, containing Twenty-one Bags of Tea, weighing upwards of Four Hundred and Eighty Pounds, Part of a much larger Quantity, which they put into a Cart brought with them for that Purpose, and which they feloniously carried away: And also feloniously took from the Person of the said James Dray his Pistol, and two other Pistols wrapped up in a Parcel, knocked him off his Horse, and trampled upon him with their Horses, so that his Life was in the most imminent Danger: They also feloniously stole and carried away both the Horses with which the said James Dray was coming to Town, which have since been recovered: But an Alarm being given, that some Persons were in Pursuit of these Horses which had been so stolen, they were disturbed in the further Robbery of the Waggon, and made their Retreat.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this most daring Highway Robbery, is hereby pleased to promise His most Gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover Two or more of his Accomplices therein, so that they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
