her, becaufe they faw they could not efcape falling into the hands of the faid Privateers, From Sicily we understand, that ten French Men of War, and as many Gallies were to winter at Mefrina, and that the reft were to return to Theulon.

Vienza, Octob. 31. General Cobs, who commands the Emperors Forces in Hungary, demands a supply of Troops, for that otherwife he cannot make head against the Rebels, fince they have been reinforced with fo confiderable a number of Poles. On Wednefday laft was performed the Ceremony of invefling the Marquis de Grana with the Order of the Golden Fleece.

Ditto, Novemb. 1. In Hungary the Malecontents are become very confiderable fince the affiftance they have received from the Poles; and, it is faid, that the Imperialists are not at prefent firong enough in those parts to make head against them, wherefore more Troops will be fent thither with all diligence. We now expect here in few days the Duke of Lorrain to confummate his marriage with the Queen-Dowager of Poland.

From the Camp before Stetin, Novemb. 8. The laft night we sprang a Mine, which we had prepared under the Ravelin which lies between the Holy Ghoft Gate and the New Gate, which having done the defired execution, we thereupon made our Artack, and with that fuccefs, that we made our felves Masters of the faid Ravelin, and lodged our felves there. We are now preparing for a general Affault; fo that a few days will without doubt put an end to this Siege one way or other.

Hamburg, Novemb. 9. Contrary to the expectation of all people Stetin holds our still, our last Letters from thence are of the 6.h inftant, and then they had news in the Camp, brought by Deferters who came out of the Town, that the perfon who has ever fince this Siege been employed on Meffages backwards and forwards between Count Coning marke and the Befieged, was within two days arrived at Stetin, and brought an affurance of a speedy Succor, which had gready encouraged the Belieged to perfift in the refo-lution they had taken to hold out to the very laft moment. The ill weather hinders the Danes from making any great progress in the Siege of the Febr-Scans in the life of Rugen. From Berlin they write, that they were there in expectation that Stetin would be forrendred in few days.

Ditto, Novemb. 12. Stetin holds out fiill, and though the Letters we receive this afternoon from the Camp fay, that the Befiegers had made themfelves Mafters of a Ravelin, and that they were preparing for ageneral S.orm, yet many people are of opinion the place will not be fo fuddenly taken ; for, it is thought the Burghers if they did not know themfelves to be in a condition to defend themselves, would not refuse those Terms which have been now lately offered them by the Elector of Brandenburg. The Danes in the lile of Rugen are fill employed in attacking the Febr-Scans, without making any confiderable progress that we hear of.

strasburg, Novemb. 8. The Duke of Lorrain decamped not from Phaffenhouen till the 6th inftant, having put Garifons into Neumyler, Lichterberg, and Ingmeyler, and marched towards Spire and Groon-Weissenburg; and we are informed, that as this day, the Head-quarter was to be at Hatten, where the Duke of Lorrain will take a general review of the Army, and then fend the Troops to their respective Winter-The Electors of Trier and Menty will each quarters. provide Winter-quarters for three Regiments within their respective Territories. Colonel Fourlani, who

was taken prifoner by the French, has his liberty, and is arrived in the Imperial Camp.

Hague, Novemb. 16 Great preparations are making for the reception of their Highneffes, who are expected here yet before the end of this M nth. The States General have given orders to the Comptroler of the Artillery to prepare as many Fireworks as he can pofficly, which are to be made use of here the evening alter their Highnefics arrival, among other the publick demonstrations of joy that are then intended to be made in this place We have Letters from Lubecke of the 11th instant, which fay, that there was arrived a Veffel, the Mafter whereof reported, that the Danes had made themfelves Mafters of the Febr-Scans, which will need a confirmation The L tters from Copenbagen speak of the indifposition of the King of Sueden, and that his Majefty had for that reason been obliged to leave the Army, and to go to Helmfadi,

Helmistain, Paris, Nov. 17. In our laft we acquainted you with the account we received from Germany, that the Marefehal de Crequi had befieged Fribourg in Br /g.w., to which we have no-thing to add at prefent, unlefs we tell you, that it is the gene-ral perfusifion of people here, that this Siege will not be a work of above Bor 10 days. We are preparing here for a very early Campagne, and, it is faid, that it will be begun before *famany* is ended. In the mean time we talk much of Peace, and the opener ground for it ferms to be, a belief that the States the great ground for it feems to be, a belief that the States General of the United Provinces will do what hes in them to beget in their Allies a greater difposition thereto than they feem to have hithered had. They write from Nimiguen, that the Imperialists will not admit the Minister of the Bishop of Stratbrurg into the Treaty ; and that our Ambaffadors have there-upon declared, that till he be received, they will not treat upon any matters relating to the pretentions of the Duke of orrain
