THIS Day the Right Honourable Henneage Earl of Aylesford, the Right Honourable Thomas Lord Walsingham, and the Right Honourable William Wyndham Grenville, were, by His Majesty's Command: sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective Places at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased to deliver the Custody of the Seals of the Duchy and County Palatine of Lancaster to the Right Honourable Thomas Earl of Clarendon, the Oath of Chancellor of the said Duchy was this Day, by His Majesty's Command, administered to his Lordship.

St. James's, January 2.

Yesterday the Earl of Chesterfield had the Honour to kiss the King's Hand on being appointed His Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the King of Spain.

And this Day Arthur Stanhope, Esq; had the Honour to kiss the King's Hand on being appointed His Majesty's Secretary of Embassy to the King of Spain.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Earl of Aylesford to be Captain of the Yeomen of His Majesty's Guard.

Lord De Ferrars to be Captain of His Majesty's Band of Gentlemen Pensioners.

And the Earl of Galloway to be one of the Gentlemen of His Majesty's Bedchamber.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

Requiring Passes, formerly granted to Ships and Vessels trading in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, to be returned in to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and other Passes of different Forms to be issued.

WHEREAS by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-eighth Day of August, in the Sixteenth Year of Our Reign, We did charge and command all Our loving Subjects who then were, or should be, possessed of any Passes for Ships and Vessels belonging to Our Subjects trading to Portugal, the Canaries, Guinea, the Indies, into the Mediterranean, or elsewhere, in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, (except such Passes as had been granted to Ships gone or going

to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they could not be timely furnished with New Passes) that they should, before the Thirty-first Day of August, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-seven, return the same, and furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of the Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their several Ships and Vessels, in such Manner as by the said recited Proclamation was directed: And whereas it hath been humbly represented unto Us, that there is the greatest Reason to believe, that many of Our Passes may, either by Accident, or undue Means, have fallen into the Hands of Foreigners, who, by Colour of such Passes, may carry on their Trade; We, taking the Premises into Our Royal Consideration, and judging it necessary to put a speedy Stop to all such indirect Practices, which do not only tend to the Prejudice of Our Trading Subjects, but may occasion a Misunderstanding between Us and the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, for preventing thereof, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby declare, That all such Passes of the present Form, now in being, shall not continue in Force longer than till the Thirty-first Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-four, (except such Passes as have been granted to Ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they cannot be timely furnished with New Passes; and that in such Case, the Passes of the present Form do continue in Force for Two Years, from and after the said Thirty first Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-four). And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving Subjects, who are or shall be possessed of any such Passes, that they do, before the Thirty-first Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-four, return the same (except such as are before excepted) into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, or to the respective Collectors of Our Customs at the Out-Ports of Great Britain and Ireland, or to the Governors of some of Our Foreign Plantations or Dominions, in order to their being cancelled; and that they do furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their several Ships and Vessels, according to the Treaty subsisting between Us and the said Governments on the Coast of Barbary, and the Regulations made by Our Royal Predecessor King George the First, by Order in His Privy Council on the fourteenth Day of June, in the Year One thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, so far as the same remain unaltered by

by the Regulations made by Us in Our Council on the Twenty-eighth Day of August, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-six, and according to the further Regulations then there made, and Our Instructions given to Our said Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, touching the same: And whereas many Ships and Vessels belonging to Our loving Subjects, continue several Years trading from Port to Port in the Mediterranean, without returning Home, whereby they cannot so conveniently procure their Passes to be exchanged; We do hereby, for the Ease of Our trading Subjects, publish and declare Our Pleasure, That upon the Application of any Owner of any Ship or Vessel, or other substantial Merchant, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and Oath made by him of the Property of such Ship or Vessel, and that Three Fourths of the Company are Our Subjects, according to an Act made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of Our Royal Predecessor King Charles the Second; (intituled, "An Act for encouraging and encreasing of Shipping and Navigation,") or such other Proportion as may be authorized by Act of Parliament, and upon entering into a Bond for the Return of such Pass at the End of Three Years, or of the Voyage, if that shall sooner determine, it shall and may be lawful for Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, for the Time being, and they are respectively empowered to make out a New Pass for such Ship or Vessel, and send the same to such of Our Consuls in the Mediterranean as the said Owner or Merchant shall desire, with Direction to such Consul, that, upon Application to him from the Master of the Ship, for which the Pass is made out, and surrendering up his Old Pass, and entering into a like Bond for the Return of such New Pass, he shall deliver out the said New Pass to such Master, and transmit the Old One, with the Bond, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain: And in order more effectually to hinder, for the future, any Abuses that may be attempted by Foreigners relating to the New Passes to be issued as aforesaid; We do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That all such New Passes, to be hereafter issued for any Ships or Vessels whatsoever, belonging to any of Our Subjects, inhabiting the Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, shall be made out in a peculiar Form; different from the Form of the New Passes, to be issued for Ships and Vessels belonging to any other Part of Our Dominions; and that such New Passes shall be lodged with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief for the Time being, of the said Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, and issued out only by him, according to the Regulations made by Our said Royal Predecessor King George the First, and Ourselves in Council as aforesaid: And the said Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and Commander in Chief, is hereby charged and required, not to issue or deliver out any such Passes to any Persons whatsoever, other than such as are really Our Subjects, inhabiting in the said Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, and strictly to conform themselves to the Regulations and Instructions made and given as aforesaid: But in regard it sometimes happens, that Ships belonging to Our Subjects of other Parts of Our Dominions, call in at Gibraltar without Passes, and have Occasion to be furnished therewith; We do, for the further Convenience of Trade, hereby publish

and declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That it shall and may be lawful for Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland for the Time being, and they are respectively hereby impowered, to lodge Mediterranean Passes, of the same Form with the New Passes, for Ships and Vessels belonging to any other Part of Our Dominions, in the Hands of Our Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief of the Town and Garrison of Gibraltar, with Directions to him to issue and deliver out such Passes to any of Our Subjects, not being Inhabitants of the said Town and Garrison of Gibraltar; provided the Person or Persons applying for the same, do comply with and conform to the several Rules and Regulations now in Use, and required to be observed by such Our other Subjects. And We do hereby order, That the Commissioners of Our Customs in Great Britain, and the Commissioners of Our Revenue in Ireland, do cause to be carried into Execution such Parts of the said Order of Council of the Fourteenth Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, concerning Passes, as relate to themselves, and the proper Officers under them, so far as the same remains now in Force, and of Our Order aforesaid, made in Council, on the Twenty-eighth of August, One thousand seven hundred and seventy six; and that they do direct their Officers in the several Ports of Our Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, to demand of the Masters of all Merchant Ships, so soon as they shall return into Port from a Foreign Voyage, all Passes granted as aforesaid, which shall be in their Possession, to be produced to the said respective Officers of Our Customs; and that if the same shall appear to be of an older Date than Twelve Months, for Ships and Vessels trading on this Side the Streights Mouth, or for Ships and Vessels trading to a greater Distance, in case the Voyages of such last mentioned Ships and Vessels shall be determined, then such Passes shall be delivered up to the said respective Officers of Our Customs, and be by them returned to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain: And in case the Master of any such Ship or Vessel shall refuse to produce or deliver up such Passes, according to the true Intent of Our said Order, then the said Officer shall certify the Name of every such Master, and of the Ship or Vessel, to Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or to Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland for the Time being, to the End that Directions may be given for putting the Bond, entered into on the granting any such Pass, in Suit: And all Our Governors, Lieutenant Governors, and Commanders in Chief of any of Our Islands, Colonies or Plantations, Consuls residing in Foreign Parts, and all other Our Officers and Ministers whatsoever, and all other Our loving Subjects whom it may concern, are hereby expressly required and commanded to yield due Obedience unto, and strictly to observe all the Orders, Instructions, Regulations, and Directions before mentioned, on Pain of Our High Displeasure.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Thirty-first Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-three, in the Twenty-fourth Year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS by virtue of an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America, and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States," several Orders have been issued by His Majesty at this Board, for regulating and carrying on the Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions, and the Inhabitants of the United States of America, which Orders did expire on the 20th Day of this instant December: And whereas by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, to continue, for a limited Time, the said above recited Act, it is enacted, that the said Act, and all the Matters and Things therein contained, shall continue and be in Force until the 20th Day of April, 1784: His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that any unmanufactured Goods or Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Oil) and any Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Indico, Masts, Yards and Bowsprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, either in British or American Ships, by British Subjects, or by any of the People inhabiting in, and belonging to, the said United States, or any of them, and may be entered and landed in any Port in this Kingdom, upon Payment of the same Duties as the like Sort of Goods or Merchandize are or may be subject and liable to, if imported by British Subjects, in British Ships, from any British Island or Plantation in America, and no other, notwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the same may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law:—

And it is hereby further ordered, that there shall be the same Drawbacks, Exemptions and Bounties on Merchandizes and Goods exported from Great Britain, into the Territories of the said United States of America, or any of them, as are or may be allowed by Law, upon the Exportation of the like Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the said United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported directly from thence, in Manner abovementioned, and may be landed in this Kingdom; and upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty commonly called the Old Subsidy (except as hereinafter excepted) such Tobacco may be warehoused under His Majesty's Locks, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of all the farther Duties due for such Tobacco, within the Time limited by Law, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Tobacco, at the Time it shall be so landed, with the same Allowances for the Pay-

ment of such farther Duties, and under the like Restrictions and Regulations in all other Respects, not altered by this Order, as such Tobacco is and may be warehoused by virtue of any Act or Acts of Parliament in Force; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Tobacco into the Ports of London, Bristol, Liverpool, Cowes, Whitehaven, Greenock, and Port Glasgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the Importer shall be at Liberty, until further Order, to enter into Bond for the Payment, as well of the Duty, commonly called the Old Subsidy, as of all the farther Duties due for such Tobacco, but without any Allowance for prompt Payment of the said Duty, commonly called the Old Subsidy, or any other of the Duties which were formerly payable in ready Money; and that if any Tobacco which has been or shall be so imported, during the Continuance of this Order, from the Territories of the said United States, into the said Ports of London, Bristol, Liverpool, Cowes, Whitehaven, Greenock, and Port Glasgow, shall be afterwards taken, within the Time limited, out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured under His Majesty's Locks, in Manner herein before directed, at either of the above Ports, to be exported directly from thence, the Bonds which have been or shall be entered into for Payment of the said Duties, shall be discharged in the Manner directed by the several Acts of Parliament in Force.

And in order to facilitate the carrying on Trade and Commerce between the People and Territories belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in the West Indies, including in that Description the Bahama Islands, and the Bermuda or Somers Islands, and the People and Territories belonging to the said United States of America, His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Hemp and Flax, Masts, Yards and Bowsprits, Staves, Heading Boards, Timber, Shingles, and all other Species of Lumber; Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, and all other Species of Live Stock and Live Provisions; Peas, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, Rice, Oats, Barley, and all other Species of Grain, being the Growth or Production of any of the said United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported by British Subjects, in British Built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any Port of the said United States of America, to any of His Majesty's West India Islands, the Bahama Islands, and the Bermuda or Somers Islands; and that Rum, Sugar, Melasses, Coffee, Cocoa-Nuts, Ginger and Pimento, may (until further Order) be exported by British Subjects, in British Built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any of the said Islands, to any Port or Place within the said United States, upon Payment of the same Duties on Exportation, and subject to the like Rules, Regulations, Securities and Restrictions, as the same Articles by Law are or may be subject and liable to, if exported to any British Colony or Plantation in America; and the Bonds and Securities heretofore required to be taken for such Ships carrying such Goods, shall and may be cancelled and discharged, upon the like Certificates as are required by the above recited Act to discharge any Bonds given in Great Britain for the due landing any other Goods in the said United States of America.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, with the Advice aforesaid, that the said several Regulations herein comprized, shall, in all Respects, be

be extended to such Ships and Goods as shall have been brought and imported from, or may be entered and shipped for Exportation to, any Part of the said United States, since the said 20th Day of this instant December.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

And all Persons upon the Continent of Europe and of North America corresponding with each other by these Packet Boats are to take particular Notice, that they are to put their Letters under Cover to their Friends in London.

Likewise, all Persons in Great-Britain or Ireland desirous of sending any Letters for the United States of America by the French Packet Boats, are to cause them to be put under Cover to some Correspondent at Paris.
