PROCLAMATION, A

Requiring Paffes, formorly granted to Ships and Veffels trading in the Way of the Couizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbury, to be re-in o the Office of the dmirulty of Great Bridan, and other Pafies of different Forms to be iffued.

HEREAS by Our Royal Proclamation, W bearing Date the Twenty-eighth Day of August, in the Sixteenth Year of Our Reign, We did charge and command all Our loving Subjects who then were, or fhould be, possessing to Our Sub-Passes for Ships and Veffeis belonging to Our Subjects trading to Portugal, the Canaries, Guinea, the Indies, into the Mediterranean, or elfewhere, in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the Go-vernments on the Coast of Barbary, (except such

to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they could not be timely furnished with New Passes) that they should, before the Thirty-first Day of August, One thousand seven hundred and leventy-leven, return che fame, and furnish them-selves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of the Commissioners for exe-cuting the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their feveral Ships and Veffels, in fuch Manner as by the faid reci.ed Proclamation was directed : And whereas it hath been humbly represented unto Us, that there is the greatest Reafon to believe, that many of Our Passes may, either by Accident, or undue Means, have fallen into the Hands of Foreigners, who, by Colour of fuch Paffes, may carry on their Trade; We, taking the Premifes into Our Royal Confideration, and judging it neceffary to put a speedy Stop to all fuch indirect Practices, which do not only tend to the Prejudice of Our Trading Subjects, but may occasion a Mifunderstanding between Us and the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, for preventing thereof, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby de-clare, That all fuch Palles of the prefent Form, now in being, shall not continue in Force longer that till the Thirty-full Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty four, (except fuch Paffes as have been granted to Ships gone or going to the Ealt Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they cannot be timely fornished with New Passes; and that in such Case, the Passes of the present Form do continue in Force for Two Years, from and after the faid Thirty first Day of Decem. ber, One thousand feven hundred and eighty four). And We do hereby frictly charge and command all Our loving Subjects, who are or shall be pos-feised of any such Passes, that they do, before the Thirty-first Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-four, return the fame (except such as are before excepted) into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, or to the refpective Collectors of Our Cultoms at the Out-Ports of Great Britain and Ireland, or to the Governors of fome of Our Foreign Plantations or Dominions, in order to their being cancelled; and that they do furnish themserves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu therof, for their feveral Ships and Veffels, according to the Treaty subsist-ing between Us and the faid Governments on the Coaft of Barbary, and the Regulations made by Our Royal Predecessor King George the First, by Order in His Privy Council on the Fourteenth Day of June, in the Year One thousand seven hundred Passes as had been granted to Ships gone or going and twenty two, fo far as the fame remain unaltered
