An Act for granting to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, seweral Duties upon Stamped Vellum, Parchment and Paper.

An Act for regulating the Sugar Trade; and for granting to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, the Duties therein mentioned.

An A:Et to promote the Linen and Hempen Manufacture, by increasing the Supply of Irish Flax Seed, and encouraging the Export of Linens, and Sail Cloth; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for the Advancement of Trade; and for granting to His Majesty, His Hirs and Successors, the several Duties therein mentioned

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion; and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters, within this Kingdom.

An Act for regulating and extending the Tobacco Trade; and for granting to His Mojefly, His Heirs and Succeffors, the Duties therein mentioned.

An Act for facilitating the Trade and Intercourse beween this Kingdom and the United States of America.

An Ast for indemnifying such Persons as have acted for the Service of the Public in advising or carrying into Execution a Proclamation of the Lord Liutenant and Council of this Kingdom, bearing Date the Thirteenth Day of November, One thousand seven hundred and eighty two; and also an Ast of Council, or Entry in

the Council Books, bearing Date the Ninth Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-three.
