Naples, Octob. 19.

ON Wednesday last one *Andrea Mellone* was torn in pieces by four Horses, according to the Sentence he had received, for having held correspondence with the French; to whom he would have delivered the *Tower del Carmine*; and in order thereunto, had held divers practices, though it appears he was not at all a person capable to execute a design of that nature. By a Tartane arrived from *Trepani* we are assured, that the French Men of War designed to fetch a fresh Convoy from *Zboulon*, were failed from *Messina*. It is said here that great numbers of Soldiers are sick at *Messina*, in so much that the Hospitals are not able to receive them all; many French desert likewise, and we begin to suspect that they do it with design, and that they are employed as Spies to learn the posture of our affairs.

Copenhagen, Novemb. 9. Yesterday Major General *Duncan*, who, it was feared was lost in the late Storm, arrived here. Monsieur *Guldenieu* is expected in few days from *Norway*, all Military action being ended on that side for this year. We are sending from hence 1600 Foot to assist the Elector of *Brandenburg* at the Siege of *Stettin*, which proves a work of great difficulty.

Strasburg, Novemb. 12. For these two days we have heard great shooting, which we understand to be at *Friburg*, the French having been before it since the 8th instant. They have already raised three Batteries, on which they have planted 30 pieces of Cannon. The Garrison consists in 2500 Foot, and 400 Horse; which would have been reinforced by several hundred of Peasants; but the place was invested so on the sudden that they could not get in. Upon this news the Imperial Army, which was marching towards *Weissenburg*, has made a halt, and five Regiments we hear are on their march, under the command of Major General *Schultz*, to try if he can put any Succor into the place. The Imperialists have put Garrisons into *Lichtenberg* and *Bisweiler*, which will very much bridle the French Garrison in *Petite Pierre*.

From the Imperial Camp at *Salmbrich* on the *Lauter*, *Novemb. 12.* The Duke of *Lorraine* having held here a general review of the Army, the orders were given to march this day, in order to the putting the Troops into Winter-quarters; but a Courier arriving with advice that the *Marschal de Crequi* has besieged *Friburg*, those orders have been changed, and new resolutions taken; what they are we cannot yet learn, farther than that several Regiments are commanded to march with all possible diligence towards *Brissow*, and that Major-General *Schultz* passed last night for *Offenbourg*. The Count de *Caprara* before this news came, had taken his march towards *Creutznaeh* in the *Tower Paléinate*, where he will have his quarter, and command the Troops that are to winter on that side the *Rhine*.

Mentz, Novemb. 13. The Imperial Regiments of

Harrant, *Stareuberg*, and *Mansfeld*, have passed the *Rhine* at *Stattmahlen*; and some others will do the like at *Philipsburg*; but news being come that the *Marschal de Crequi* has besieged *Fribourg*, it is believed the said Regiments will rejoin again, in order to the marching to the relief of the place.

Cologne, Novemb. 16. The Troops of the Bishop of *Munster*, which served in *Flanders* this Campaign, commanded by Baron *de Wedel*, have passed the *Meuse*, and are marching towards the Territory of *Aix la Chapelle*, where, it is said, they will take their Winter-quarters. Our Elector has promised by the late Treaty concluded with the Emperor, to receive 2000 Imperialists to winter in this Diocess. From *Strasbourg* they write of the 12th instant, that they were extremely alarmed at the news they had that the French had besieged *Fribourg*, to the relief of which the Duke of *Lorraine* was marching, but that it was questioned whether he would be able to arrive time enough, considering the distance he was at, and that he was to take his march through a desolate and ruined Country.

Antwerp, Novemb. 16. On Friday night his Excellency the Duke of *Villa Hermosa* arrived here from *Brussels*, and went directly to the House where the *Marquis de los Balbases* is lodged; who, to prevent that Compliment, went before to the Palace to expect his Excellency there. Saturday was spent in Visits of Ceremony, and in the evening the Court was entertained with a Ball; on Sunday in the afternoon his Excellency the *Marquis de los Balbases*, the *Marquis de Fuentes*, designed Ambassador for *England*, and *Don Emanuel de Lyra* the Spanish Minister at the *Hague*, had a Conference together, which was so secret, that they did not permit a Secretary to be present. At this Conference his Excellency was taken very ill with a sudden and violent vomiting, which turning to a Fever, continues to keep him in his Bed. Yesterday the *Marquis de los Balbases* performed the Ceremony of giving the Habit of St. *Jago* to *Don Emanuel de Lyra*, in the *Augustine* Church, in the presence of all the persons of quality in Town. Yesterday after dinner, the *Marquis de los Balbases*, the *Marquis de Fuentes*, and *Don Emanuel de Lyra*, had another Conference. Last night the Duke of *Montalto* General of the Spanish Cavalry, and Count *Egmont* came hither from *Brussels*, and this morning Count *Waldeck* from *Mainz*; and this afternoon a Council of War hath been held, upon the news we receive that the French are assembling a Body of 14 or 15000 men near *Aish*; and that according to all appearance their design is upon *Hall*. Where it was resolved, that orders should be given to all the Troops as well Dutch as Spanish that are quartered in these parts, to be ready to march upon the first command.

Brussels, Novemb. 19. From *Haynault* they write, that the French are making great preparations for the attacking of *St. Guisain*, so soon as the weather will permit.

permitted: and at the same time they seem to continue their design upon *Hall*. In the mean time our Generals are doing their part to disappoint the same. The Conference which was held at *Antwerp* is broken up, the *Marquis de los Balbuces* is preparing for his return to *Nimeguen*, and *Don Emanuel de Lyra* being gone back to the *Hague*. The Letters we receive from *Germany* do not a little surprize us, for when we had expected to have heard that as well the French as the Imperial Armies, were separated and gone into Winter-quarters, they tell us, that the *Marschal de Crequi* had on the sudden passed the *Rhine* at *Brisac*, and had besieged *Friburg*, the Capital of *Brifgow*, and in all appearance would be Masters of it before the Duke of *Lorrain* could come to relieve it, being at present at so great a distance.
