In the farther Exertion of your Powers on this Occasion, we shall look up to your Majesty, as the Guardian of the Constitution; and we venture to add, that should your Majesty appeal at length to the Event of a General Election, a Conduct so worthy the King and Father of his Subjects, would receive the most animated Support of a grateful and liberated People.
