Rome, Oftab. 30. The Pope is refolved to abolifh the great Jurificitions pretended by the Foreign Miniflers refiding here, who on the other hand are very unwilling to part with what they have been follong in poffeffion of; and for the effecting his intentions, the Pope has given command that the Garifon of this City be increafed, and that firong Guards be fet in feveral places. A new Troop of 100 Horfe has been likewife raifed, and the command of it given to the Count ds Fiefque. On Iuefday laft dyed here the Father Dominican, who was fent to the Pope by the King of *Petfit.*

Vienna, Nov. 7. The Turkish Chiaus, who arrived here two dayes fince, demands the liberty of two Perfons belonging to the Bassa of Newhauscel, which were lately taken by a party of Hussers. We are told that the Marquis de Grana is ordered to go to the Army, to command that part of it which will winter along the Rhine. From Hungary t ey write that the Rebels grow very powerful, and that they expect assistant the Turks and Tartars. General Cobs prefles for supplies from hence.

From the Camp before Stein, Nov. 12. Yeslerday about Noon a Mine was forung on the Lunenburgs fide, in which were 30 Barrels of Powder, and 200 men were commanded to poss themseives fo foon as the Mine was forung; the fame had the defired effect, but the Befieged had put themselves in fo good a possible of the secure is that we could not execute the orders that were given; in this action Lieutenant Colonel Wessimmb with feveral other Officers were killed and wounded. The hard Frost does very much incommode us in our Trenches, though we do all we can to fecure our felves against the cold, by keeping great Fires in them.

Hambrugh, Nov. 16. The Advices we receive from Stetin fay, that on the II inftant the Beliegers fprung a Mine, and followed the fame with an Attack, in which they were repulfed; that they had been informed by Deferters, that the Befieged had refolved to defend the place for three months longer; and that the cold weather did fo extremely incommode the Soldiers, and the hard Froft made their working fo difficult, that it was thought his Electoral Highnels would after all be forced to raife the Siege. The report we had of the taking of the Febr . Scans in the Ifle of Rugen by the Danes, proves a miltake ; and on the contrary, the Letters we receive this morning from Stractfond lay, that the Danes have made no great progrefs in their attacks upon the faid Fort ; and that they having brought their Men of War and other Veffels before it, to attack it on the fide of the water, they had been fo warmly received by the Fore, that they were forced to remove to a greater diffance, he that commanded the fhips with feveral others being killed. They continue to write from Denmark of the illnefs of the King of Sueden, but what ground they have for it ve know nor.

Ditto. The laft account we had of the Siege of Stetim by Letters of the 12 inftant, was, that the Beliegers having fprung two Mines, the one (the other being only intended for a falle attack) did the defired execution, and and made a breach, which 60 men might enter in front; that accordingly the Brandenburghs made an attack, but that fome of their chief Officers being killed, it fo far difcouraged them, that they could not be perfuaded to go on; which the Befieged perceiving, fallied out, and drove them back; That two dayes after two other attacks were made by the Lunenburgs and Brandenburgs in their refpective quarters at the fame time; that the former were repulled with the lofs of 30 men; and that the Brandenburgs had not fucceeded much better : fince which nothing bath paffed. Thefe unfuccefsful attempts, and the obflinate refiftance of the Befieged, ftems to make the event of the Siege fomewhat doubtful. We have nothing new from Copenhagen.

ful. We have nothing new from Copenhagen. Strasburgh, Nov. 15. The Duke of Lorrain no fooner received the News of Friburg's being befieged by the French, but he refolved to march with the Troops he had with him, (for feveral Regiments were already on the other fide the Rhine, and marching to the Winter-quarters affigned them) and to that end having repaffed the Rhins, he attived the 13 inflant at Offenburg, with an Army of 15 or 16000 men, from whence he continued his march the next morning. In the mean time the account we have of the Siege, is, that the French prefs it with all the vigor pollible; that they have already made feveral attacks, and have gained feveral zdvantageous Pofts, though not without lofs of men; and we fay here that they have had killed two Colonels, three Lifeutenant Colonelis, and 16 Captains.

Pollfsript. It is all the News in Town, that Count Mansfelt is got into Friburg with 1500 men, having fought his way through the French quarters, though with the loss of above 100 men.

Francfort, Nov. 17. The Imperialifts are extremely concerned at the News they have of the Siege of Friburg, which was, it feems, fo fudden and unexpected, -that the Governor had not time so call in the Country people, which would have been a great reinforcement to the Garifon, and are refolved to do all that lies in them to relieve it ; and in order thereunto, the Duke of Lorrain has paffed the Rhine with part of his Army, and came the 13 inflant to Offenburg, from whence he continued his march with all the diligence poffible, purpoling to be before the place on the 16; and this afternoon we have an account that the Prince of Baden was already come very near the place, and that of his Troops 1 900 men were got into Friburg. It is certain that no rime is to be loft, for the French prefs the Siege vigoroufly, and have already taken feveral Outwork.

Aix la Chapelle, Nov. 19. The Munfter Troops having continued fome time in our Neigtborhood, to try if they could by fair means perfuade us to accord them Winter-quarters in this City, to which end the Baron de Neffelraeth hath been employed in feveral meffages to our Magiffraces, but finding the fame ineffectual, they tefolved to make use of force, and accordingly planted feveral pieces, of Cannon and Mortars on the 19-Inflant, and fired feveral fhot into the Town; the Barghers were immediately put into Arms, and we in like manner made use of our Cannon againft them, which we did with that good effect, that this morning the faid Manfter Troops have withdrawn their Cannon, and have quitted our Neighborhood, leaving feveral dead behind them.

Amflerdam, Nov. 23. The Siege of Sterim feems now to draw towards an end; for our laft Letters from the Camp, which are dated the 45th, fay, that the Befiegers had made themfelves Mafters of a Baftion, and that the Belieged had thereupon demanded a Ceffation of Arms, which the Elector would net agree to. The Febr-Stans-in the Ifle of Regen holds ant full. Binffels, Novimb. 23. His Excellency the Duke de Villa Hermof a continues flill at Gbaunt, but is expected here on Thurfday or Friday next. From Strashn g we have an account, that it burg is very much profied by the French, and that the Duke of Loriniz was marching to the relief of 12.

Paris, Nov. 20. Our last Letters from the Camp before Friburg are dated the 14th, they tell us, that the 13th at night the Befiegers were advanced to the Ditch, which they filled up, with the lofs of 5 or 6 men killed, and about 40 wounded 5 That the 13th at sight the Sieur de Montille Ingeneer was killed with a Musket-Ihot, as he was passing the Effarpe 5 and that night the Befiegers took two Half monts of the Castle, the Count d Buffy was killed. The Duke of Lorrain is marching to the r-lief of the place, but in all appearance will come too late 5 his Troops are faid to be in a very ill condition.

Duro, Nov. 24 On Sunday last we had the confirmation of the taking of Friburg on the 16 instant.; and the next da; Te Drum was sung in our Cathedral on that occasion. It feems the Duke of Larrain was advanced heyond Offenbarg, to the relief of it: 1500 Foot and 400 House marched out of the place.
