WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Gentlemen, Clergy and Freeholders of the County of Denbigh, assembled at a County Meeting duly summoned by public Notice from the High Sheriff, at the same Time that we lament the political Divisions of the present Time, beg Leave to offer to your Majesty our most grateful Acknowledgments of that salutary and expedient Exercise of your Majesty's Royal, constitutional, and undisputed Prerogative of dismissing, from the Public Service, the late Ministers of the Kingdom.—A Set of Men, who, separated in Principle, were united only in that Lust for Power and Employment; which they grasped at with Deceit and obtained by Violence: Men, who fortunately for the Kingdom, at an early Period of their Administration, were weak and daring enough to discover a Design, in one and the same Measure, of sacrificing the Rights and Properties of Individuals, and the just and equitable Limits of our sacred Constitution,

Long may your Majesty continue to be the watchful Guardian of your own Prerogatives, and therein of your People's Rights; whilst we making humble Offers, as we now beg Leave to do, of our Lives and Fortunes, in Support of your Majesty's Exertions to these great Ends, are satisfied, we do all that in us lies to transmit inviolate to Posterity, that Constitution which has been bequeathed to us by the Virtues and Wisdom of our Forefathers, trusting that, in the End, your Majesty, by Divine Providence, may reign quiet and undisturbed in the Hearts and Affections of a free and united People.
