We trust your Majesty will graciously be pleased to persevere in such Measures as in your Royal Wisdom shall seem meet, to preserve the Lustre of your Crown undiminished, and to guard the Freedom of your People against the Designs of any Faction.

Permit us also, (zealously attached as we are to those Principles which placed your Majesty's illustrious Family on the Throne,) to express our warmest Approbation of and Readiness to support that proper and constitutional Exercise of the Royal Prerogative, which we deem essentially necessary to the Preservation of our dearest Civil Rights and Religious Liberties.
