To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the High Sheriff and Grand Jury for the County of Essex, assembled at the Assizes held this 10th Day of March, 1784.

Most Gracious Monarch!

NEVER did Subjects approach their Sovereign with purer Zeal, and more sincere Affection, than we who now beg Leave to lay our Sentiments at the Foot of your Throne.

The Confidence which your Majesty has so justly placed in the Voice of your People, not only renders cheerful the Hearts of your Subjects throughout your Dominions, but unites their Opinion and Affection in the fullest Approbation of your Majesty's Wisdom and Firmness.

It would therefore ill become us who are at this Time assembled for the Preservation of the Public Peace, and the Maintenance of the Honour and Dignity of your Crown, to remain in Silence, lest that Silence should be imputed to an Approbation of those violent Measures which have sown such Dissensions in the House of Commons, to the Delay of Public Business, and threaten us with Evils more terrible than the War so lately ended.

With deep Concern we find ourselves obliged to declare Sentiments contrary to the Opinion and Resolutions of our House of Representatives, in Parliament assembled, at a Time when the Public Interest, the Defence of these Realms, and the Honour of your Majesty's Crown, require more than a common Unanimity, within and without Doors, to pursue those Measures which will restore our Commerce, repair our Credit, and regulate our Expenses with more Economy than has of late been used.

It is therefore with firm Hearts and open Hands we approach your Royal Person, declaring our Resolutions to support you against all Attempts to encroach upon the legal Prerogative of your Crown, which is so necessary for maintaining the Liberties of your People; and are most cheerfully ready with our Purse to contribute our Aid in Defence of these Realms, against the common Enemy, and in the Support of Public Credit which totters under the unhappy Divisions we lament;—Divisions founded in the ambitious Views of disappointed Men, who wish rather to dictate than advise, and whose Thirst of Power appears so immoderate, that they seem

more ready to seize than willing to accept the Offices of State.

The late violent Attempt to sacrifice the Charter of the East India Company, under the specious Pretence of Regulation, has opened the Eyes of your Majesty's Subjects. It is owing to your Vigilance, and to the Wisdom of the hereditary Council of the Nation, that this Design has been frustrated. A Measure that seemed more intended to controul the regal Authority in this Country, than to correct the Abuses, or promote the Interest of the Company.

That your Majesty has removed from your Councils those Men who invented and devised such a Measure, and placed in Authority those who better deserve your Favor, and in whom your People can place more Confidence, appears to us to have been an Exertion of your Majesty's Royal Prerogative, not more seasonable than just; and we hope your Majesty's Firmness on this Occasion will tend to render your Reign more easy, and your People more happy.

Permit us, Royal Sir, to express our sincere Wishes for the Health and long Life of so good a Prince: And that you may always find Servants whose Characters, Fortunes, and Abilities, may render them fit for the Service of their Country, and do Honour to your Majesty's Appointment, is the fervent Prayer of your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects.

WE have lately beheld; with Concern and Anxiety, a daring Attempt under the most artful and plausible Pretences, to destroy the Chartered Rights of the first trading Company in the Nation, ratified by the most solemn Sanctions of the Legislature. The Hazard to which the Property of every Incorporated Society in the Kingdom must have been exposed if that Attempt had proved successful, as well as the extraordinary Power which the Patronage of the East would have afforded to Men capable of employing it to Purposes hostile to the Constitution, excited in us Apprehensions of the most alarming Nature: We are happy to find that these are now dissipated, by the reasonable Interposition of your Majesty, in exercising, for the Preservation of the Constitution, the Prerogative with which it had invested you, of removing from your Councils Men who dared to introduce and support Measures so dangerous and unprecedented. The dutiful Expressions of Loyalty, and unshaken Determination to support the best System of Government on Earth, presented to your Majesty from every Quarter of the united Kingdoms, will, it may be hoped, teach an useful Lesson to future Ministers,

how hazardous it may prove to themselves to encroach upon any Branch of the Constitution, or to sport with the Rights of a free People.

AS several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have from Time to Time gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; The following Abstracts of Two Acts of Parliament of George the First and George the Second, to prevent such Practices, are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them.—And it will be observed, that they extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms; and in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS or the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted, shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid, If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's

city's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from thenceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Person shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, and of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase; and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath before any Justice of Peace that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid; such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted upon Indictment of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King, not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there:

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country, not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted upon Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Bri-

tain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures; or any Part of such Tools, he shall for every Offence forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Effin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools; prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall for every such Offence forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.
