E have lately beheld; with Concern and Anxiety, a daring Attempt under the moft artful and plaufible Pretences, to deftroy the Chartered Rights of the first trading Company in the Nation, ratified by the most folemn Sanctions of the Legiflature. The Hazard to which the Property of every Incorporated Society in the Kingdom must have been exposed if that Attempt had proved fuccefaful, as well as the extnaordinary Power which the Patronage of the Halt would have afforded to Men capable of the Halt would have afforded to the Conflitution, excited in us Apprehensions of the most alarming Nature : We are happy to find that thefe are now diffipated, by the feafonable Interpofition of your Majesty, in exercising, for the Prefervation of the Conflitution, the Prerogative with which it had invested you, of removing from your Councils Men who dared to introduce and fupport Measures fo dangerous and unprecedented. A S feweral Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, bave from Time to Time gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; The following Abstracts of Two Acts of Parliament of George the First and George the Second, to preaent such Practices, are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penaltics they may incur by Disbedience to them.—And it will be observed, that they extend to those who are any ways concerned or infrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, and in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

I F any Perfon fhall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and fhall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Weftminfler, or at the Affizes or Quarter-Selfions, he fhall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS or the first Offence, and fhall be imprifoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convict, fhall offend again, he fhall be fined at the Differention of the Court, and imprifoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid. If any of the King's Subjects, being fuch Artificers, fhall go into any Country out of His Ma-

jefty's
