HE following Address of the Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Carnarvon, has been prefented to the King by John Parry, Efq; Representative in Parliament for the said County, being introduced by the Lord of His Majesty's Bed-chamber in Waiting: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty, The humble Address of the Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Carnarvon unanimously resolved on at a numerous and respectable General Meeting, held at Carnar-von on the Fisteenth of March, 1784, con-vened by public Advertisement from the Sheriff.

Most Gracious Sovereign!

E, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of Carnarvon, approach your Presence with the warmest Affection for your Royal Person, Family and Government.

We humbly request your Majesty will accept our unfeigned Acknowledgments for the Dismission of your late Ministers, who had justly forfeited all Public Confidence.

In your Majesty's prefent Selection of Ministers, we see, with heartfelt Satisfaction, Men called to your Councils of high Reputation for Public Virtue, Love of Freedom, and distinguished Attachment to the British Constitution.

Whilst we observe that your Majesty's Ministers do not at this Time possess the Confidence of the Commons House of Parliament, so essentially requisite, according to the original Principles of our free Constitution, to the Existence of every Administration, we consider with serious Concern that the Sense of the People at large is not to be collected from their present Representatives.

We therefore humbly take this Occasion to shew to you Majesty our firm Reliance, that from your Majesty's paternal Attention to the Welfare of your Reople, the Abilities, Zeal, and Integrity of your Ministers, and the evident Necessity of the Measure impressed on the Minds of your faithful Subjects, fuch Reformation of Parliament will take Place, that in all Circumstances the genuine Voice of a free and loyal People shall be fairly and fully expressed by their Representatives.

Parliament, at the Opening of the present Session.

Under this Impression we think ourselves called upon, in the present critical Conjuncture, to declare our Abhorrence of fuch factious Proceeding, and at the same Time our firm and determined Resolulution to support and defend, with our . ives and Fortunes, if necessary, not only our own Constitu-tional Rights and Privileges, but also the just Prerogative of the Crown, (which we conceive to be effentially connected with the true Liberty of the Subject) whenever any undue Attempts are made to invade either.
