N a full Confideration of the present Situation of Affairs, and of the extraordinary Circum-flances which have produced it, I am induced to put an End to this Session of Parliament: I feel is a Duty, which I owe to the Constitution and to the Country, in such a Situation, to recur as speedily as possible to the Sense of My People, by calling a New Parliament.

I trust that this Measure will tend to obviate the Mischies arising from the unhappy Divisions and Distractions which have lately subsisted; and that the various important Objects, which will require Confideration, may be afterwards proceeded upon with less Intercuption, and with happier Effect.

I can have no other Object, but to preserve the true Principles of our free and happy Constitution, and to employ the Powers entrusted to Me by Law, for the only End for which they were given, the Good of My People.
