For Diffolving this prefent Parliament, and Declaring the Calling of another.

GEORGE R. WHEREAS We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to diffolve this prefent Parliament, which now flands prorogued to Tuefday the Sixth Day of April next: We do, for that End, publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby diffolve the faid Parliament accordingly: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Bur-geffes, and the Committioners for Shires and Burghs, of the House of Commons, are discharged from their Meeting and Attendance on Tuesday the faid Sixth Day of April next. And We being defirous and refolved, as foon as may be, to meet Our People, and to have their Advice in Parliament, do hereby make known, to all Our loving Subjects, Our Royal Will and Pleafure to call a New Parliament: And do hereby further declare, that, with the Advice of. Our Privy Council, We have, this Day, given Or-der to Our Chancellor of Great Britain to islue out Writs, in due Form, for Calling a New Parliament ; which Writs are to bear Telle on Friday the Twenty-fixth of this inftant March, and to be returnable on Tuesday the Eighteenth Day of May following.

PROCLAMATION. In Order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen

Peers of Scotland.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS We have, in Our Council, thought fit to declare Our Pleafure for Summoning and Holding a Parliament of Great Britain, on Tuesday the Eighteenth Day of May next on Ineiday the Eighteenth Day of May next enfuing the Date hereof: In order therefore to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to fit in the Houfe of Peets in the faid Parliament, We do, by the Advice of Our Privy-Council, iflue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, firstly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to affemble and meet at Holy Rood Houfe, in Edinburgh, on Saturday the Eighth Day of May next enfuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers, to fit and vote in the House of Peers, in the faid enfuing Parliament by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Prers that shall then be prefent, and of the Proxies of fugh as shall be abfent; (fach Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly figned before Witneffes, and both the Constituent and Proxy: being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or fuch Two of the Principal Clerks of the Selfion as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively re-quired to attend such Meaning, and to administer the Oaths required by Law no be taken there by the faid Peers, and to take their Votes; and, immediately after fach Election made and duly examined, to certify the Names of the Six-toon Peers to elected, and fign and attent the fame, in the Preferce of the faid Peers the Electors; and return fuch. Certifican, into our High Court of Chantery of Great friam, and We do, by this Our Provide of Editburgh, and alcother the Ma giftrates of the faid City, to take especial Care to preferve the Peace the cut during the Time of the preferve the Peace the edf, during the Time of the faid Election ; and to prevent all Manner of Riots, Tumults, Diforders, and Violeace whatfoever. And We strictly charge and command, That this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Crofs at Edinburgh, and in all the County [

Towns of Scotland, Twenty-five Days at f 1e2 fore the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the faid Peers to proceed to fuch Election.
