A PROCLAMATION.
*For Dissolving this present Parliament, and Declaring
 the Calling of another.*

GEORGE R.
WHEREAS We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to dissolve this present Parliament, which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the Sixth Day of April next: We do, for that End, publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby dissolve the said Parliament accordingly: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burghes, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs, of the House of Commons, are discharged from their Meeting and Attendance on Tuesday the said Sixth Day of April next. And We being desirous and resolved, as soon as may be, to meet Our People, and to have their Advice in Parliament, do hereby make known, to all Our loving Subjects, Our Royal Will and Pleasure to call a New Parliament: And do hereby further declare, that, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, We have, this Day, given Order to Our Chancellor of Great Britain to issue out Writs, in due Form, for Calling a New Parliament; which Writs are to bear Telle on Friday the Twenty-sixth of this instant March, and to be returnable on Tuesday the Eighteenth Day of May following.

Given at Our Court at the Queen's House, the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-four, in the Twenty-fourth Year of Our Reign.

A PROCLAMATION.
*In Order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen
 Peers of Scotland.*

GEORGE R.
WHEREAS We have, in Our Council, thought fit to declare Our Pleasure for Summoning and Holding a Parliament of Great Britain, on Tuesday the Eighteenth Day of May next ensuing the Date hereof: In order therefore to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to sit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament, We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, strictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to assemble and meet at Holy Rood House, in Edinburgh, on Saturday the Eighth Day of May next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers, to sit and vote in the House of Peers, in the said ensuing Parliament by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall then be present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be absent, (such Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly signed before Witnesses, and both the Contituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law. And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks, of the Session as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the said Peers, and to take their Votes; and, immediately after such Election made and duly examined, to certify the Names of the Sixteen Peers so elected, and sign and attest the same, in the Presence of the said Peers the Electors; and return such Certificates into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the said City, to take especial Care to preserve the Peace thereof, during the Time of the said Election; and to prevent all Manner of Riots, Tumults, Disorders, and Violence whatsoever. And We strictly charge and command, That this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County

Towns of Scotland, Twenty-five Days at
 fore the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of
 the said Peers to proceed to such Election.

Witness Ourself at Westminster, the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-four, in the Twenty-fourth Year of our Reign.

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty,

Most Gracious Sovereign,
WE your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, assembled at a General County Meeting, pursuant to Notice advertised by the Sheriff, beg Leave to approach your Throne, with Assurances of our most zealous and affectionate Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government; and to express our Gratitude for your Majesty's Wisdom and paternal Regard for the Welfare of your People, in dismissing from your Councils the late Ministry.

With the utmost Concern we beheld Men, under the Mask of Public Good, invading the Chartered Rights of the Subject, and attempting to establish a Power equally hostile to the Constitutional Prerogatives of the Crown, as to the Liberties of the Subject; and have seen with deep Concern a Majority of that Branch of the Legislature, whose Duty it is to speak the Sense as well as guard the Privileges of the Subject, struggling to compel your Majesty to take again into your Service those who had forfeited your Royal Confidence, and the Approbation of your People.

We entertain an high Sense of the Integrity and Abilities of the Ministers, whom your Majesty has thought fit to place and continue in the First Departments of the State; and have a firm Reliance on the Sincerity of their Intentions to promote the Public Welfare, which will be best secured by obtaining for your loyal Subjects a Representation in Parliament consonant to the true Principles of our Government.

That the Almighty may preserve your Sacred Person, and prosper your Councils for the Public Good, is our fervent Prayer.
