WE, your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects, think it incumbent on us, at a Time when the Public Tranquility is disturbed, and the National Business interrupted by unhappy Differences among the Representatives of the People, to approach your Throne with the warmest Assurances of Loyalty to your Majesty's Person and Government, and to acknowledge with Gratitude the Wisdom of our Ancestors, in annexing to the Crown of these Realms the undoubted Prerogative of appointing to all the great Offices of executive Power.

In this unprecedented and alarming Crisis of Public Affairs, we trust that your Majesty will be supported by Ministers of Abilities and Integrity, who, whilst they support the legal Prerogatives of the Crown, will at the same Time stand forth Protectors of the sacred Rights of the People, and maintain the just Balance of these Powers which form the Safety and Glory of our envied Constitution. It is our most zealous and ardent Wish, that our latest Posterity may behold the British Throne occupied by illustrious Descendants of your Majesty, and surrounded by Men of real Virtue and Patriotism.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Magistrates, Council, and Freemen, of the Burgh of Week, beg Leave, at this important Crisis, to assure your Majesty of our unshaken Loyalty, and steady Attachment to your Sacred Person and Government.

We have long beheld, with deep Regret, the Efforts of a Faction struggling for Power, to distract your Majesty's Councils, and retard the Measures of Government. We saw, with no less Concern and Abhorrence, the late Attempt made by those Men when in Power to create a new System of Government in this Country, dangerous to the Constitution, as it was calculated to increase their own Influence, and perpetuate their Power.

THIS Day his Grace the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, with the usual Solemnity, and the Commons being sent for, gave the Royal Assent to the following Bills, viz.

An Act for the issuing of Treasury Bills to the Amount therein mentioned, for the Purpose of promoting Manufactures by providing for the Settlement of a Number of industrious Manufacturers at Prosperous, in the County of Kildare.

An Act for regulating the High Court of Admiralty in this Kingdom.

An Act for Relief of Persons who have omitted to qualify themselves according to Law.

An Act to enable the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue of Excise, to empower the Brewers of Small-Beer, at certain Times, and under certain Circumstances, to charge an higher Price for Small-Beer than by Law they are enabled to charge for the same.

An Act to amend an Act, intituled, An Act for preventing Bribery and Corruption in Elections for Members to serve in Parliament.

An Act for the Relief of the several Persons interested in the Ship *Vriendschap* and her Cargo, which were captured by two British Privateers, and brought as Prize into the Port of Cork, in the Year One thousand seven hundred and seventy-nine.
