E, your Majesty's very dutiful and loyal Suby jects, the Mayor, Aldermen, Freemen, and Inhabitants of the Town and Borough of Hertford, beg Leave to approach your Royal Person with our humble Acknowledgments for your conflant and unwearied Attention to the Interests of this Nation, and Assurance of our firm Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, and to our excellent Constitution, as considing of King, Lords, and Commons, which we are happy to find is the general Voice of our Fellow-Subjects. 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The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS there was this Day read at the Board, the humble Petition of feveral Merchants of London, in Behalf of themselves dit, and fettle and support good Government and others, trading to Spain, humbly praying, for

the Reasons therein contained, That all Ships and Vessels coming from the Ports of Spain, within the Mediterranean Sea, laden in fuch Ports with the Products of Spain only, may be exempted from the present Orders for Quarantine: His Majesty having taken the faid Petition into Confideration, and being defirous to remove all Obstructions upon Trade, so far as may be consistent with the Health and Safety of His Subjects, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, That the Quarantine, at prefent subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, be taken off, so far as respects Ships and Vessels coming directly from any of the Forts of the Kingdom of Spain, within the Mediterranean, or from the Island of Minorca, laden with the Products of Spain only; and that all such Ships, as also all Ships and Vessels arriving from the Town or Port of Gibraltar, be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings, without unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine; provided that they bring with them clean Bills of Health; and that the Malter or other Person taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel, do first make Oath before the Custom House Officer, or Chief Magistrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they are bound to, that they did not touch at any infected Place, nor had Communication with any infected Ship during the Voyage, and that their Crews are free from all Infection. And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, His Majelly's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the Illes of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain Steph. AS Several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have from Time to Time gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; The following Abstracts of Two Acts of Parliament of George the First and George the Second, to prevent such Practices, are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incar by Disobedience to them .- And it will be observed, that they extend to those rubo are any ways concerned or infrumental in the Sending or Entiting Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, and in the Export ation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap: 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Affizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS or the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convict, shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being fuch Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majefty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any luch Foreign Country, exercising any of the faid Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by tain, in the Country where such Artiscers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from thenceforth inhabit within this Realm; fuch Person shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, and of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase; and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath before any Justice of Peace that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforefaid; such suffice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before Some other Inflice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions: And if such Person shall resule to give Secuzity, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the and secure the same.

next Affizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted upon Indictment of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purpole aforefaid, he shall give such Security to the King, not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, sand shall be imprisoned till Security

If any of the above Offences shall be committed Scotland the same shall be prosecuted in the

Court of Jufficiary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13. IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour 1 to feduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, orany other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country, not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted upon Indictment or Information in the King's Bench-at Westminster, or by Indistment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justicial or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or feduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprifonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted. for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forseit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any fuch Tools or Utenfils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manusacturers or any Part of such Tools, he shall for every Offence forfeit all fuch Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts, in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c.

shall be allowed.

Forfeiture be paid.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utenfils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publickly sold to the best Bidder; and one Mojety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall feize. If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall for every such Ossence forseit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inslicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forseit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forseit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office

under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.
