HE following Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Freemen, and Inhabitants of the Town and Borough of Hertford, has been prefented to the King by John Calvert, Efq; one of the Representatives in Parliament for the faid Borough, being introduced by the Eord of His Majefty's Bed chamber in Wait-ing: Which Addrefs His Majefty was pleafed to receive very gracioully.

To the KING's molt Excellent Majefty;

The humble Address of the Mayor; Aldermen; Freemen; and Inhabitants of the Town and Borough of Hertford.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

E, your Majerly's very dutiful and loyal Sub-VV jects, the Mayor, Aldermen, Freemen; and Inhabitants of the Town and Borough of Hertford, beg Leave to approach your Royal Perfoit with our humble Acknowledgments for your confant and unwearied Attention to the Interests of this Nation, and Affurance of our firm Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, and to our excellent Constitution, as confifting of King, Lords, and Commons, which we are happy to find is the general Voice of our Fellow-Subjects. We congratulate your Majelty, that the late Acts of Government have attained the End which we persuade ourselves is the great Object of your Majesty's Withes, the Public Satisfaction. The Removal of the late Administration, (whole Conduct was founded neither on found Policy, nor conflictuional Rectitude) has been and must ever be confidered as a Measure of the highest Propriety : And the Appointment of those Perfons, whom your Majefty has been pleafed to call to your Councils and the Great Offices of State, gives us the most flattering Prospect of all the Success that is naturally expected to refult from Integrity and Ability. . The Diffolution of the late Parliament appears to us to have been an Expedient the best calculated for the Re-structure of Public Order, and for the frustrating and breaking the Combinations against the true Interests both of your Majesty and your People. And as we cannot but respectfully admire your Majesty's Firmness in resisting all Attempts to de-feat so falutary a Purpole, and in Support of your own Royal and legal Prerogative, fo we must with Gratitude applaud your Majefty's Difpolition and Declarations to maintain likewife the Rights of your Subjects, both reciprocally necessary for the Prefervation of the Pablic System and Welfare.

We truft that the beft Confequences will flow from the seafonable Appeal now made by your Majesty to the Senfe of your People in the Choice of their Reprefentatives; and that fuch Perfons will be returned to Parliament as will bring with them the best Intentions to concur with your Majefty and your Ministers in all fuch Measures as may tend to promote Commerce, invigorate Cre-
