Gologne, Nov. 26. The Dake of Neuburg, after having had a long Conference with our Elector, parted hence on Tuesday last to Bensberg. The Brandenburg Troops, who came from the Maes, are come into the Countrey of Meurs, intending to pafs the Rhine at Riferratz. The diffute with the City of Aix la Chapelle is not yet determined, the General of the Munfter Troops will not abate any thing of the demand they made concerning that Cities granting them Winterquarters; in the mean time those Troops continue to rove up and down in the County of Eyffeir, to the great vexation of the Inhabitants; and we are told that if the City of Aix cannot be brought to accord them the Winter-quarters they demand for 4000 men, they will pass the Rhine, and go and winter in the County of Maffam, and in the Wetteravia. After all that has been faid of our Electors going to refide ar Bonne, pursuant to the Treaty lately concluded bet ween the Emperor and him, at prefent we hear no more of it. From Strafburg and those Parts they write, that the French purfue their advantage in Brifgow, and at present besiege the Caffle of Hoogburg, which it's thought will not be able to make any great reliftance.

Leyden, Nov. 27. One Hendricke Verhoef Gold-Imith, Inhabitant of the Hague, (who is faid to-have been one of the chief Promoters of the diforders in 1672. and who had a principal hand in the murther of the Sieurs de Witt) having been fome time fince apprehended here for fome mildemeanors by him committed, this morning received his Sentence to be publickly whipped, and afterwards to be put into the Rafp, or Working-house of this City, there to remain for the fpace of 50 years; which Sentence was accordingly executed with great feverity, the Executioner having given him near 60 Stripes, amidst an extraordinary Concourfe of People, who flocked from all parts of this City, as well as from the Neighborhood, to have the fatisfaction of feeing this punishment and infamy-overside aperfon, who, in respect of his former Crimes, had deferved a much feverer one,

Hague, Nov. 30. It is with great impatience that we expect the arrival of their H ghneffes the Prince and Princess of Orange, who, we believe, are kept on the other fide by the contrary Wind, and the foul Weather. His Highneffes Coaches have been for fome dayes at Maefland-Sluys, ( where their Highneffes will Land ) to carry them directly to Honflaerdyke, where they will make fome thort flay, to give time to prepare the Court here for their Reception. We expect every day to hear that either Stetin is taken, or elfe the Siege raifed; for as on the one hand the Befieged feem to be brought upon their laft legs, fo on the other this weather will make It almost impossible to continue the Siege; and according to our last advices, there seems the greatest appearance of the latter. In Brifgor the French with great diligence purfue the advantage which the taking of Friburg hath given them; and we are told that by means of this Conquest, they will be able to extend their Contributions very far into the neighbouring Provinces.Some of the greatelt ships of the Squadron defigned for Sicily, and fitted at Amffer dam, have already paffed the Pampus, as the reft will do with the next High Tyde. The Spanish Minister has paid r great Sum of Money to the Admiralty for this Equipage, and given good lecurity for the payment of the reft.

Earie, Nov. 27. By Letters from fome Officers in our Army in Germany, we have these particulars of the besting and taking of Friburg by the Mareschal de Grequi, piz. That on the 9th instant the place was in

vefted ; That on the 10th, the Trenches were opened, and carried that night within 20 paces of the Ditch of the Town; That the fame night a Battery of 17 Cannon was raifed, which the next day made a breach eighteen yards wide; That the 12th a fmall Redoubt was taken by the Regiment of Normandy at the first onfer, which stands upon a Hill opposite to the Castle; but of little use to the Besiegers, by reason they could not get up their Guns thither ; That the 13th the Marefchal de Crequi fent a Summons to the Governor, who returned for answer, That he would defend the place to the laft ; That the 15th, the Marefchal de Crequi caufed a general Affault to be made upon the New Town, our Troops attacked them very floutly, and after fome fmall lofs on our fide, forced the Befieged to retire into the Old Town, ( there being a little wall that divided the New and Old Town ) behind which they retrenched themfelves, and beat back our men that would have made a Lodgment under the wall, with the lofs of near 500 men, and 30 Officers, befides a great many wounded : Whereupon the Marelchal de Criqui prefently fent for his heaviest Cannon, and caused a Battery to be raifed that night in the New Town, which beat down fo much of the O'd Town, that it was laid quite open , and our Foot being well fortified in the ftreets and houles, Orders were given for making a fecond Attack, when the Belieged beat a Parley for the Town onely; but the Mareschal de Grequi would by no means grant its except the Caffle were comprehended alfo : at length the Governor, to fave the Garifon and the Town, made good Conditions for both, and the 16 in the afternoon there marched out of the Town and Caffle 1500 Foot, and 250 Horfe, with Arms, Baggage, Colours flying, and two pieces of Cannon, and were conducted to Rhinfelden
