THE King has been pleased to grant to Thomas Lock, Esq; (Norroy King of Arms) the Office of Clarenceux King of Arms, and Principal Herald of the South, East and West Parts of the Kingdom of Great Britain called England.

The King has been pleased to grant to James Gladell, of Hereford-street, in the Parish of St. George Hanover Square, in the County of Middlesex, Esq; and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to take and use the Name of Vernon, in Addition to that of Gladell, and to bear the Arms of Vernon, pursuant to the last Will of the Right Honourable Francis Vernon, Earl of Shipbrook, late of the Kingdom of Ireland, deceased, (such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office;) and also to order, that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

The King has been pleased to grant to Thomas Peirse, of Acklam Hall, in the County of York, Esq; and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to take and use the Surname of Hustler only, and also to bear the Arms of Hustler, (such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office) in Compliance with the Request, and pursuant to the last Will and Testament of Mrs. Evereld Hustler, late of Acklam Hall aforesaid, deceased; and also to order, that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

The King has been pleased to grant to Thomas Macklin, of the Town of Derby, Esq; and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to take and use the Surname of Wilson only, and also to bear the Arms of Wilson, (such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office;) pursuant to the last Will and Testament of the Reverend Thomas Wilson, D. D. Prebendary of Westminster, and late of the City of Bath, deceased; and also to order, that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Proprietors of Land, of the County of Orkney.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most faithful and loyal Subjects, Proprietors of Land in the County of Orkney, beg Leave to approach the Throne with Hearts full of the warmest Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government.

Permit us to assure your Majesty that we unfeignedly partake of the Satisfaction so general among

your Majesty's affectionate Subjects, on Account of the Removal of your late Ministry, and of the Rejection of the East India Bill, which we conceived to be fraught with the most alarming Consequences, tending to strip Property of its best Securities, and Liberty of its very Existence among us; making a daring Step towards the Establishment of a hateful Aristocracy, on the Ruins of that excellent Constitution, which is the highest Boast and greatest Blessing of Britons; and that we entertain a just Abhorrence of every factious Measure that is calculated for, or has a Tendency to un hinge the happy Arrangement of its Parts.

Although from some Peculiarities of Condition in which your Majesty's Subjects of this Country are placed, we do not enjoy the full Measure of Security in our Property, which happily belongs to the Rest of your Majesty's Subjects; yet we too highly prize the Share of those we possess, to hesitate in concurring in every necessary Measure for repelling Encroachments on the British Constitution, and on your Majesty's Prerogative, as making an essential Part thereof.

We beg Leave also to join the publick Voice of Approbation, with which your Majesty's gracious Choice of New Ministers has been followed, and to express our full Confidence in them.

That your Majesty's Life may be prolonged as an inestimable Blessing to a free and happy People, is the fervent Prayer of your loyal Subjects.
