## A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

*For preventing of Riots and Tumults by disorderly Persons in the City and County of Edinburgh; and for discovering, apprehending, and bringing to Justice, the Persons who were concerned in attacking the Distillery belonging to Mess. Haig and Company at Cannonmills, and in destroying the Distillery at or near the Village of Ford, both in the County of Edinburgh.*

**W**HEREAS it has been represented unto Us, That a great Number of disorderly Persons in the City of Edinburgh, and Suburbs thereof, assembled themselves, and, in a riotous and tumultuous Manner, upon the Fourth Day of this instant June, proceeded to the said Village of Cannonmills near Edinburgh, where they attacked a Distillery, Dwelling House, and other Houses, belonging to Mess. James Haig and Company, at that Place, and having forced the Gate of the said Work, and threatened to burn and destroy the same, were with Difficulty prevented from carrying their Threats into Execution; That on the Monday following, a Number of riotous and disorderly Persons again assembled, and with a Drum beating, and Fife playing, marched to the aforesaid Place, where they made another outrageous and daring Attempt upon the said Distillery, and having set Fire to some Casks, attempted therewith to burn certain Outhouses belonging to the said Mess. James Haig and Company, and actually did set Fire to a Hay Rick, which, with some Carts and other Implements, were accordingly destroyed: And further, that upon the Day last mentioned, or soon after, a Number of other Persons, from the Towns of Dalkeith and Musselborough, did in like Manner proceed to the said Village of Ford, where they attacked and destroyed a considerable Distillery there erected, in order to prevent (as they pretended) the Consumption of Corn in the said Distilleries, and for other wicked and unlawful Purposes, by which the Peace of the said City and County, and the Lives and Properties of Our loving Subjects, are greatly endangered: We therefore, being deeply sensible of the many mischievous Consequences that must inevitably ensue to the Peace of Our Kingdom, and the Lives and Properties of Our loving Subjects, from such wicked and daring Outrages, if they shall go unpunished; and in order to deter all others from committing the like for the future, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby strictly charge and command all Magistrates, and other Civil Officers whatsoever, and all other Our Subjects, to be aiding and assisting, to the utmost of their Power, in suppressing such illegal and tumultuous Assemblies, and in detesting, apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in instigating the same; and

guilty of any of the Violences before-mentioned: And We do hereby promise and declare, That if any Person or Persons concerned in the aforesaid outrageous Attack upon the Distillery at Cannonmills, and forcing the Gate there, or in destroying the Distillery at Ford, or setting Fire, or attempting to set Fire, to any of the Property belonging to the said Mess. James Haig and Company, or to the Owner of the Distillery at Ford, shall, on or before the Twenty-fifth Day of August next, and before such Person or Persons shall be in Custody for the same, discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any other Person or Persons who hath or have, or shall have been concerned in any of the said heinous Offences, so as he, she, or they, may be convicted thereof, such Discoverer or Discoverers shall have Our most gracious Pardon for the said Offences: And, as a further Encouragement to such as shall discover the said Offenders, We do hereby further promise and declare, That any Person or Persons, not in Custody as aforesaid, who shall, on or before the said Twenty-fifth Day of August next, discover and apprehend, or cause to be discovered and apprehended, any of the Persons concerned in the aforesaid outrageous Attack upon the Distillery at Cannonmills, and forcing the Gate there, or in destroying the Distillery at Ford, or in setting Fire, or attempting to set Fire, to any of the Property belonging to the said Mess. James Haig and Company, or to the Owner of the Distillery at Ford, so as he, she, or they, may be convicted thereof, shall have and receive, for every Person so discovered, apprehended, and convicted, the Sum of FIFTY POUNDS Sterling; which said Sum of Fifty Pounds Sterling, for every such Offender so discovered and convicted, the Lords Commissioners of Our Treasury for the Time being are hereby directed and required to pay, upon the said Discovery and Conviction being certified by Our Advocate of Scotland for the Time being, without any further or other Warrant in that Behalf. And lastly, We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving Subjects, that they do use their utmost Diligence and Endeavours, in their several Places and Stations, to find out, discover, and apprehend, all such Offenders as aforesaid, upon Pain of Our highest Displeasure.

**W**HEREAS by virtue of an Act passed in the last Session of the late Parliament, for continuing, until the Twentieth of this Instant June, the several Powers granted to His Majesty



jefty in and by an Act passed in the Twenty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for preventing certain Instruments from being required from Ships belonging to the United States of America, and to give to His Majesty, for a limited Time, certain Powers for the better carrying on Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the said United States," His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council bearing Date the 16th of April last, to make divers Regulations for carrying on the Trade and Commerce between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions, and the Inhabitants of the United States of America. And whereas by an Act passed in this present Session of Parliament; the said last recited Act, and the Powers thereby granted to His Majesty, are further continued until the 1st Day of August, 1784; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that any unmanufactured Goods or Merchandizes, the Importation of which into this Kingdom is not prohibited by Law, (except Oil) and any Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Indico, Masts, Yards and Bowsprits, being the Growth or Production of any of the United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported directly from thence into any of the Ports of this Kingdom; either in British or American Ships, by British Subjects, or by any of the People inhabiting in, and belonging to, the said United States, or any of them, and may be entered and landed in any Port in this Kingdom, upon Payment of the same Duties as the like Sort of Goods or Merchandize are or may be subject and liable to, if imported by British Subjects, in British Ships, from any British Island or Plantation in America, and no other, notwithstanding such Goods or Merchandize, or the Ships in which the same may be brought, may not be accompanied with the Certificates or other Documents heretofore required by Law:—

And it is hereby further ordered, that there shall be the same Drawbacks, Exemptions and Bounties on Merchandizes and Goods exported from Great Britain, into the Territories of the said United States of America, or any of them, as are or may be allowed by Law, upon the Exportation of the like Goods or Merchandize to any of the Islands, Plantations, or Colonies, belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in America.

And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that any Tobacco, being the Growth or Production of any of the Territories of the said United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported directly from thence, in Manner abovementioned, and may be landed in this Kingdom; and, upon the Importer paying down, in ready Money, the Duty commonly called the Old Subsidy (except as hereinafter excepted) such Tobacco may be warehoused under His Majesty's Locks, upon the Importer's own Bond for Payment of all the farther Duties due for such Tobacco, within the Time limited by Law, according to the net Weight and Quantity of such Tobacco, at the Time it shall be so landed, with the same Allowances for the Payment of such farther Duties, and under the like Restrictions and Regulations, in all other Respects, not altered by this Order, as such Tobacco is and may be warehoused by virtue of any Act or Acts of Parliament in Force; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure nevertheless, that upon the Importation of any such Tobacco into the Ports of London, Bristol, Falmouth, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Whitehaven, Greenock, and Port Glasgow, or either of them, in the Manner herein before expressed, the

Importer shall be at Liberty, until further Order, to enter into Bond for the Payment, as well of the Duty, commonly called the Old Subsidy, as of all the farther Duties due for such Tobacco, but without any Allowance for prompt Payment of the said Duty, commonly called the Old Subsidy, or any other of the Duties which were formerly payable in ready Money; and that if any Tobacco, which has been or shall be so imported, during the Continuance of this Order, from the Territories of the said United States, into the said Ports of London, Bristol, Falmouth, Portsmouth, Cowes, Liverpool, Whitehaven, Greenock, and Port Glasgow, shall be afterwards taken, within the Time limited, out of the Warehouses wherein the same shall be secured under His Majesty's Locks, in Manner herein before directed, at either of the above Ports, to be exported directly from thence, the Bonds which have been or shall be entered into for Payment of the said Duties, shall be discharged in the Manner directed by the several Acts of Parliament in Force.

And in order to facilitate the carrying on Trade and Commerce between the People and Territories belonging to the Crown of Great Britain in the West Indies, including in that Description the Bahama Islands, and the Bermuda or Somers Islands, and the People and Territories belonging to the said United States of America, His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, Hemp and Flax, Masts, Yards and Bowsprits, Staves, Heading, Boards, Timber, Shingles, and all other Species of Lumber; Horses, Neat Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, and all other Species of Live Stock and Live Provisions; Peas, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, Rice, Oats, Barley, and all other Species of Grain; being the Growth or Production of any of the said United States of America, may (until further Order) be imported by British Subjects, in British Built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any Port of the said United States of America, to any of His Majesty's West India Islands, the Bahama Islands, and the Bermuda or Somers Islands; and that Rum, Sugar, Melasses, Coffee, Cocoa-Nuts, Ginger and Pimento, may (until further Order) be exported by British Subjects, in British Built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any of the said Islands, to any Port or Place within the said United States, upon Payment of the same Duties on Exportation, and subject to the like Rules, Regulations, Securities and Restrictions, as the same Articles by Law are or may be subject and liable to, if exported to any British Colony or Plantation in America; and the Bonds and Securities heretofore required to be taken for such Ships carrying such Goods, shall and may be cancelled and discharged, upon the like Certificates as are required by the above recited Act to discharge any Bonds given in Great Britain for the due Landing any other Goods in the said United States of America.

And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

was, upon the Seventh Day of this Instant June, charged by Information of Three credible Persons, upon Oath by them subscribed, before John Aldridge, Esq; One of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, with having been guilty, upon the Twentieth Day of May now last past, of being, together with other Persons to the Number of Three and more, to wit, about One Hundred Men, most of whom were armed either with Fire Arms, or other offensive Weapons, that is to say, Carbines, or Blunderbusses, and large Bludgeons, and so armed being assembled on the Sea Shore, near Worthing aforesaid, and taking and rescuing a certain Quantity of Tea and Foreign Geneva, the same being uncustomed Goods, after Seizure thereof by one of the said Informants, being an Officer of Excise; and also of having actually given Orders to several of the said large Number of Men, to fire and kill the Informants; which Information was afterwards by the said John Aldridge, certified under his Hand and Seal, and returned to One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, who has laid the same before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of His late Majesty King George the Second; His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, require and command, that the said Richard Hodgkinson do surrender himself, within Forty Days after the first Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, to the Lord Chief Justice, or One other of His Majesty's Justices of the Court of King's Bench, or to One of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace.

*Constantinople, May 25.* The Grand Signior has just issued an Imperial Edict, by which the British Merchants are exempted for the future from the *Masavia* Duty on all Goods imported from their Country to Constantinople, and on such unprohibited Merchandizes as they export from Constantinople to their own Country, after paying the other Customs prescribed by the Imperial Capitulations.

The Plague prevails in many Parts of this City, particularly in the Quarters of the Arsenal and Harbour, though its Progress is happily retarded by the Coldness of the Weather, and the Northerly Winds. The Accounts from the Islands are very alarming. At Smirna the Infection has increased considerably, and has again manifested itself at Kerfon.

*Venice, June 5.* The Plague still rages in Dalmatia, particularly at Spalatro, which City, consisting lately of about Four Thousand Inhabitants, is already nearly depopulated. The Suburbs however are yet free from the Contagion, nor has it hitherto extended itself further in the neighbouring Island of Brazza.
