Tangier, Octob 16.

HE Woolwich, the Portland, the Assurance and the Saphire Frigats, as they were Cruising, met the other day to the Westward of Cape Spartel with 7 Turks Men of War, to whom they gave Chace, but could not get up to them ; the Saphire out-sailing the rest gained upon one of the Rearmost snips of the Tarks mounted with 40 Guns, and 400 men, and coming up with her, was engaged with her several hours, but th Night approaching, the Algierin stood away towards the Spanish Coast, where, the Wind blowing very hard upon the Shore, it is believed she may be stranded.

Ditto, Nov. 22. Sir John Nirborough is failed with the Men of War under his Command for Argices.

Naples, Novemb. 2. The Provisions are not at all plentiful at Messina, as the Advices we receive from those Parts assure us; and besides there is a Sickness among the French Soldiers, so that many dye. It is added that the last Convoy which arrived at Messina, did not bring Provisions proportionable to the necessities they were in.

Genoua, Nov. 17. We are told that the Most Christian King has resolved to employ his Arms this next Campagne against the Spaniards in Milan, and that the Duke of Savoy will assist him therein. Last Night arrived here the Concord, John Towles Master, from England. The Algierins, we hear, upon the advice they had that Sir John Narbonough has taken several of their ships, have resolved to do the like on their part; that is, to take all they meet with belonging to the English.

Ditto, Nov. 24. The 20th instant arrived the Prudence, Nathaniel Beckett Master, from Legorn. This day is come in the Fountain, John Warren Master, from Rotterdam; and the Golden Fleece, Richard May, from Libon. We are rold that 2000 French are come to Aste, part of those Troops designed for the carrying the War into Milan the nex Campagne.

Madrid, Nov. 18. On the 17 indant the Duke de Veraguss took possession of the Gemmand of Captain General of Galicia, formerly possessed by the Ma qui. de Fal:es, who is appointed to go Ambathdor from this Crown to the Emperor. On the 25, Sig nor Geronimo Zene Ambaffador from the Republick of Venice, parted hence, to make room for his Successor Signior Frederico Cornaro. The States of Arragon (where Don Pedro d'Arragon prefides on the pair of the King) are at present affembled, they have made several wholfom Establishments for that Kingdom, and have resolved to raise and entertain a Regiment of 1 500 Foot at their Expences for 50 years. On the 3d initant the King re turned from the Escuriat; the 6th being the Anniverfary of his Birth, the Court appeared full of splendor. On the 8th there was a Bull Feast in the Placa Mayor, in which, belides some inserior persons on soot, two Gentlemen that fought with the Bull on Horfe back, ere desperately wounded. On the 20th of September an Order was published, that within 15 dayes all the

French residing here, should Register themselves before a publick Officer, and that they, except fuch a were of servile and mechanick Professions, should depart out of Madrid, and 12 Leagues distance from it, taking Passports to the places whither they should remove, without carrying any fort of Arms or Travelling above three or four in a Company; that as for such who should precend to remain here as being Naturalized, or for any o. her reafon, they should within 15 dayes present themfelves to the Council of Gastile, which a great many accordingly did, and presented to the said Council their Parents for Naturalization, under the confidence and scurity whereof, many of them were married to Spanish Wome 1, and had fetled their Families here; but the Council being perplexed with the variety of fuch Preten. fions on the 3d inftant, a new Order was published in confirmation of the abovementioned, adding fome cirsumstances for the better declaration of his Majesties pleasure, and extending both the Orders to all the French residing in these Kingdoms, even such as had armed themselves with Patents of Naturalization, viz. That whatever Frenchman that shall remain here, shall not be permitted to exercise any Trade or Commerce in any fort of Merchandize whatfoever; and that those that shall choose to return to their own Countrey, shall be allowed the remainder of this year 1677, to carry our their Effects. The Portuguere Armada returned to Lkbon from the Mediterranean, about the beginning of the last month: On the 18th of the same, departed out of that River four ships, having at least 2000 perfons, Men, Women and Children on Board, to plant a new Colony at Coambo near Mazambique in Africa over against Madagascar; they expect to find great store of Gold there.

Rostock, Nov. 24. The Besieged in Stetin desend themselves to admiration, nothing is able to lessen their courage and resolution, and according to all appearance the Elector of Brandenburg will be obliged to raise the Siege. The Suedes in the Fehr-Scars in the Isle of Rugen, likewise defend themselves very well. It is said the Danes intend to attack the Fort which Count Coningsmark has raised on this side, and that in order thereunto they stop all the Vessels they can meet with.

Ditto. The Siege of Stetin feems yet to require time to end it, the Besieged remain obstinate, not to give ear to any overtenes for a Capitulation; and on the other hand the Elector of Brandenburg is resolved not to quit the Siege, though he should be forced to continue it the woole Winter. Passengers come from the Camp; report that his Electoral Highness has not at present above 10000 Foot there, and that the Cavalry especially is in a very ill condition. In Rugen the Danes seem to despair being able to take the Febrescans, till Stetin be into the hands of his Electoral Highness.

Bruffels, Nov. 29. His ficellency the Duke de Villa Hermofi continues at Ghaunt, where he hath received the Complaints that have been made to him of the Extortions committed by several spanish Officers upon the Countrey people, in which his Excellency is resolved

to do them justice, and for that reason hath caused a strict Examination to be made, in order to the punishment of those that are sound culpable. We hear no farther of the Plot for the delivering St Ghislain to the French, save that nothing can be proved against those persons that were arrested, and sent to Mins upon that account. There has been a great discourse in Town this day, that several French Troops are marched towards Ipres, and that they have closely blocked it up.

Ditto, Decemb. 3. Yesterday arrived fierean Express from Mons, who brought advice that the Frerch had befieged St. Ghillain the day before; that they had laid two Bridges over the River, had posted themselves betwixt the Redoubt and the Town; that on Wednesday Night their Cannon, &c. arrived in the Camp, being brought by warer from Conde; that they had planted fix pieces of Cannon upon the Dyke, which goes from 'St. Ghiflain to Mons; that they mike no Lines about the place, reckoning to be Matters of it by Sunday next. Ac the sime time we are told that the Count de Montal is drawing together the Troops between the Sambre and the Mrufe, and that the Troops of the Kings Hou-shald are on their march. We cannot yet tell whether our Governor will make any attempt to relieve St. Gbiflin, but it is faid, that it will be impossible for us to drawany confiderable Body into the Field, except the fame provision were made for their substitute, as is for the French, by creeking Magazines in several places, from whence an Army might be supplied with Forage and other Provisions, which are not at this time of the year to be found in the Field. I pres is in a manner blocked up, for the French have put strong Garisons into Furnes, Montcaffel, and other places round it | The Sieur Calvo, Governor of Maestricht, has belieged the Castle of Bremont near Liege, which he did so unexpectedly, that he invested it, while the Governor of it was at Liege; the Garison consists in two Companies of Major General Spaen's Troops. From Meiz they write, that the French make great preparations on that fide, and that the Imperialists have quitted Sarbruck and the other Posts they had upon the Saar. The Mareschal de Crequi is going to put his Troops into Winter-quarters.

Dirro, Decemb. 7. His Excellency the Duke de Villa Hermofa returned hither on Saturday Night from Ghaunt, in his way conful ed with Count Waldeck at Malines, about succouring of St. Ghislain; which being resolved upon, Orders were sent to Monsieur Louvigny to march with the Ofnabrug Troops, to be at the General Rendezvous appointed to morrow betwixt this place and Hall; Count Waideck at the sime time disperfed Orders to all his Highnesses the Prince of Oranges Army, to march towards the faid Rendezvous, depending upon his Excellencies promise and care for all forts of Provision for the Army. The Foot and Horse carry with them five dayes Bread, and the Horsemen Oats for their Horses for the same time, which hath been this day delivered our to them, and they will have five dayes more upon their march. The last account we had from St. Ghislain, was written from Mons yesterday morning, which faid the Enemy began their Attacks the Evening before in three places; that they had taken one of the Redoubts upon the Dyke Towards Mons, and that those within had abandoned another; that they played very furiously with their Cannon and Musquets all Night, and they have been heard all yester-night, and this Night past, but with what success we know not. This morning Count Waldeck and Monsieur Louvigny came hither, and their Troops have been marching this day through and on both fides this Town towards their Ren-A Prous. This day his Excellency called the Generals

to a Council of War, where they have concerted all things relating to their march; to morrow Night the Army will encamp on the other fide of Hall, betwixe Limbec and Tubife, from whence they will direct their march, according to the Advices they shall receive of the Enemies motion. A Peasant is come this day from the Camp before St. Ghissin, which he left last night, and gives an account that the Enemy pursued the Siege with great vigor, that they had turned the course of the River betwixt Mons and St. Ghissin, had laid all under Water towards Harchies, cut down the Woods, make large Trenches cross the wayes, and barricadoed all the passages, so that we fear it will be a hard matter to relieve the place. The Governor of it is counted a brave resolute man, who has been in several Sieges.

Paris, Decemb. 4. The 30 past the Kings Troops invested St. Ghislain near Mons, and the next day the Mareschal d'Humieres, who commands the Siege, arrived with the Count de Nancre, Governor of Acth, in the Camp. The Letters we receive from Assace are of the 28th past, they tell us, that the Maresc al de Crequi was going to put his Troops into their Winter quarters. From Stelly we have an account, that our Troops there

were very much weakned with fickness.

Ditto, Decemb. 8. Our Letters from Flanders say, the Siege of st. bifl in advances very successfully; that the Besiegers had taken a Redoubt, which lies at some distance from the Town, and is of great use to them.

Whiteha'l, Decemb. 1. Their Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Orange, after having been far several dates detained on this side by the contrary Winds, safety arrived on Thursday last in Holland, as His Majesty is informed by Captain Lovell, Commander of the Catherine Tacht, one of those that attended their Highnesses, who came up this Evening.
