BY an All of the last, and also one of the present Seffion of Parliament, for establishing certain Regulations concerning the Portoge and Conveyance of Letters and Packets by the Post between Great Britain and Ireland, to take Place on the Aft of August next, all Letters and Packets are to be charged and paid for according to the prefent Rates of Postage in Great Britain, and the Rates established by the Ast of Parliament in Ireland, except to and from certain Per-fons subo, by Virtue of the respective Offices in Great Brizain and Ireland, now fend and receive Letters and Packets free from the Duty of Postoge provided that all fuch Letters and Packets fo fent thall relate to the Business of their respective Offices, and that there shall be certified on the Outside of such Letters and Packets, under the Hand Writing of Such Officers respectively to be On His Majesty's Service, and that fuch Letters and Packets shall be fealed with the Seal of the Office, or or Officer fending the fame. And in Cafe any fuch Officers shall receive under Cover to them any Letters or Packets intended for or directed to other Perfons, all fuch Officers are required to fend the fame to the General Boft Office in London, or Dublin, in order that fuch Letters and Packets may be charged with the Duty of Postage; it being the true Intent and Meaning of this AE, that the Privilege of Jending and receiving Let-ters and Packets by fuch Officers, shall extend to such Letters and Packets only, as relate to the Business of their respective Offices.

It is a fo enabled, That all Perfons may fend printed Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Popers to and from Great Britain and Ireland, at the Rate of One Penny only for each printed Vote, Proceeding in Parliament, and each printed News Paper, in Covers open at Both Ends, to be paid when they are put into any Post-office in Great Britain; but the Penny need not be paid before band upon Papers from Ireland, as it can be received on their Delivery in Great Britain.

It is likewife enacted, That His Majesty's Postmaster-General may authorize certain Persons to send and re-ceive printed Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers by the Post to and from Great Britain and Ireland, at the Rate of One Penny only for each printed Vote, and Proceeding in Parliament, and each printed News Paper, over and above the printed Price thereon.

All Perfons therefore who swift to be supplied with News Papers for Ireland, or from Ireland for Great Britain, may have them regularly fent, by applying by Letter, or otherwife, to the Clerk of the Chefter Road, at the General Post-Office in London, or to the Postmaster of any Town in Great Britain, where a News Paper is printed; or to the Secretary of the General Post-Office in Dublin.

The Price of a Paper fix Times a Week, at 3d. each, with 1 d. for the Postage, will be 51. 4s. per Annum; an Ewening Paper three Times a Week, 21. 12s. per Annum, and so in Proportion for the London Gazettes, other Papers, Sc. And by an All poffed
