We already perceive good Effects refulting from the Intprove-ment of our Conflictution and Commerce, and anvicipate still more extensive Advantages.

The Charter, by which we hold our Privileges as a Corporation, was the Reward, and flands a Monument, of our Ancestors Loyalty; and we are happy in assuing your Majesty, that the same dutiful and loyal Spirit continues to animate their Succeffors, pure and undiminished : We cannot therefore observe, without Sorrow and Indignation, the Tumults which have unhappily prevailed in the Capital of this Kingdom, and heg Leave to affure your Majefty, that in our feveral Capacities we will maintain that Loyalty which has ever diffinguished this ancient Town, by fupporting your-Majefty's Government, and by promoting Industry, good Order, and Submission to the Laws. By fuch Principles and fuch Conduct in your Majefty's Subjects of Ireland, do we hope for the Continuance of your Majefty's Protection, and for the Peace, Liberty and Happiness of the Kingdom.

With every Sentiment of Affection and "Attachment to your Majefty's Person, Family and Go-vernment, we are your Majefty's ever faithful and dutiful Subjects.

As feveral Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjets of Great Britain, have from Time to Time gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; The following Abstracts of Two Aciss of Parliament of George the First and George the Second, to prevent such Practices, are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penaltics they may incur by Disobedience to them — And it will be observed, that they extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, and in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

TF any Perfon shall contract with, entice, or dolicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Aflizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS or the first Offence, and shall be imprifored Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Ferfon having been once convict, shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Differentiation of the Court, and imprifored Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

prifoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid. If any of the King's Subjects, being fuch Artificers, fhall go into any Country out of His Majefty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the faid Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any fuch Foreign Country, exercising any of the faid Trades, that not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassidor, Minister or Conful of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassidor, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from thenceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Person thall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, and of taking any

Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Defcent, Devife or Purchafe; and thall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majelty's Ufe, and fhall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath before any Justice of Peace that any Person is endeavour-ing to feduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majelty's Dominions, for the Purpofes afore-faid; fuch Justice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before fome other Juffice; and if it fhall appear by the Oath of one Witnefs, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences; fuch Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter. Sel-fions : And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Juffice may commit him to Goal till the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions, and until he shall be delivered by due Courfe of Law. And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted upon Indictment of any fuch Promile, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purpole aforefaid; he shall give fuch Security to the King, not to depart out of His Majefly's Dominions, as fuch Court thall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland the same shall be profected in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

F any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to feduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country, not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted upon In-dictment or Information in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Jufficiary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if fuch Offence be committed in Ire-land; the Perfon fo convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or feduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Impri-fonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Foreiture be paid : And in Cafe of a subsequent Offence of the fame Kind, the Perfons fo again offending fhall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or feduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender fhall be convicted, for Two Years, and until fuch Forfeiture be paid.

If any Perfon in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to fome other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any fuch Tools or Utenfils as are commonly ufed "ufed in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufacturers or any Part of fuch Tools, he shall for every. Offence forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Sociland, or at any of the Four Courts, in Dublin respectively, wherein no Ession, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to feize and fecure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on goard any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain ; and all Tools so feized shall, after Condemnation, be publickly fold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall feize and fecure the fame.

If the Captain of any Veffel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the faid Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Veffel, he fhall for every fuch Offence forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Perfons exporting the Tools; and if the Veffel belongs to His Majefly, the Captain fhall not only forfeit ONE HUN-DRED POUNDS, but thall alfo forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majefly.

If any Officer of the Cuftoms in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly fuffer the fame to be done, he fhall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforefaid, and alfo forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majefty.

under His Majefty. One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majefty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

That Letters and Packets above 150 Miles, within England, shall pay in Addition, Single 2d., and fo in Proportion.

That Letters and Packets to or from the General Post-Office in London, to or from the City of Edinburgh, Dumfries and Cockburnspeth, shall pay in Addition, Single 1d. and so in Proportion.

That Letters and Packets above one Post Stage, and not exceeding 50 Miles, within Scotland, shall pay in Addition, Single 1 d. and so in Proportion.

It is provided, that no Letter or Packet to or from Glafgow, or the intermediate Places by Carlifle, not paffing through London, fhall pay an higher Rate than if fent through Edinburgh to or from Glafgow; and that no Letter or Packet fent to or from Edinburgh, or any intermediate Place in England and Scotland, North of London, fhall pay an higher Rate than 7 d. for a Single Letter, and fo in Proportion.

It is further provided, that no Letter or Packet, together with its Contents, shall be taxed at an higher Rate than as a Treble Letter, unless it shall weigh an Ounce, when it shall be rated as Four Single Letters; and every Quarter of an Ounce above that Weight shall be charged as a Single Letter.

It is likewife enacted, that from and after the last Session of Parliament, no Letter or Packet fent by Post, within Great Britain, directed by any Member of either Houfe of Parliament, shall be exempted from the Duty of Poltage, unlefs the whole Superfeription thereof shall be of the Hand-writing of the Member, and shall have endorfed thereon, in the fame Hand-writing, the Name of the Member, Post Town from whence the same is to be fent, and the Day, Month, and Year, when put into the Post Office, the Day of the Month to be in Words at length; and unless every such Letter and Packet shall be put into the General, or other Post-Office, or into a Receiving House, on the Day of the Date put upon such Letter or Packet : And no Letter or Packet directed to any fuch Member shall be exempted from the Duty of Postage, unless fuch as shall, during the Sitting of Parliament, or within Forty Days before, or Forty Days after any Summons or Prorogation thereof, be directed to any fuch Member, at the Place where he shall actually be at the Time of the Delivery thereof, or at his ufual Place of Refidence in London, or at the Houfe, or Lobby of the Houfe of Parliament, of which he is a Member.

It is further enacted, that all Perfons who, by Virtue of their Offices, fend and receive Letters and Packets free of Postage, shall fend and receive them free, in the Manner, and under fuch Restrictions, as any Member of Parliament.

It is alfo enacted, that if any Perfon fhall forge or counterfeit the Hand-writing of any Perfon whatfoever, in the Superfeription of any Letter or Packet, in order to avoid the Payment of Poltage, or fhall forge, counterfeit, or alter, or procure to be done, the Date upon fuch Superfeription, or thall write, and fend by Polt, or caufe to be done, any Letter or Packet, the Superfeription or Cover whereof fhall be forged or counterfeited, or the Date thereon altered, in order to avoid the Duty of Poltage, knowing the fame to be forged, counterfeited, or altered, every Perfon fo offending, fhall be deemed guilty of Felony, and fhall be transported for Seven Years.

BY an Att of the last, and also one of the prefent Seffion of Parliament, for establishing certain Regulations concerning the Portage and Conveyance of Letters and Packets by the Post between Great Britain and Ireland, to take Place on the 1st of August next, all Letters and Packets are to be charged and paid for ac-cording to the present Rates of Postage in Great Britain, and the Rates established by the Act of Parliament in Ireland, except to and from certain Per-fons who, by Virtue of the respective Offices in Great Britain and Ireland, now send and receive Letters and Packets free from the Duty of Postage, provided that all fuch Letters and Packets so fent shall relate to the Business of their respective Offices, and that there shall be certified on the Outside of such Letters and Packets, under the Hand Writing of Juch Officers respectively to be On His Majesty's Service, and that fuch Letters and Packets shall be jealed with the Seal of the Office, or Officer ending the same. And in Case any such Offi-cers shall viceive under Cover to them any Letters or Packets intended for or directed to other Perfons, all fuch Officers are required to fend the same to the General Post Office in London, or Dublin, in order that fuch Letters and Packets may be charged with the Duty of Postage; it being the true Intent and Meaning of this Act, that the Privilege of fending and receiving Let-ters and Packets by fuch Officers, shall extend to fuch Letters and Packets only, as relate to the Business of their respective Offices.

It is a fo enacted, That all Perfons may fend printed Votes, Proceedings in Parliament, and printed News Papers to and from Great Britain and Ireland, at the Rate of One Penny only for each printed Vote, Proceeding in Parliament, and each printed News Paper, in Covers open at Both Ends, to be paid when they are put into any Post-Office in Great Britain; but the Penny need not be paid before band upon Papers from Ireland, as it can be received on their Delivery in Great Britain.

It is likewife enacted, That His Majefly's Poftmafter-General may authorize certain Perfons to fend and receive printed Votes, Proceedings' in Parliament, and printed News Papers by the Pift to and from Great Britain and Ireland, at the Rate of One Penny only for each printed Vote, and Proceeding in Parliament, and each printed News Paper, over and above the printed Price thereon.
