Most Gracious Sovereign,

E, your Majetty's most dutiful and loyal
Subjects, the Freeholders of the County of Meath, affembled by public Notice from the High Sheriff, at Trim, on the 1st of September, 1784, beg Leave to offer to your Majesty this humble Affurance of our ited fast Attachment to your Royal Person, Family, and Government, and to the happy Constitution of Great Britain and Ireland, under which the Protestant Religion, and the Liberties of the Subject, have together grown and flourished, and are wifely and firmly secured. Whilst we see, with Concern and Indignation, the public Peace disturbed, and the Government insulted, by the Intemperance of some misguided Persons in the City of Dublin, we are happy in declaring to your Majesty, that the Tranquillity of this County has been preferved without Interruption; and we affure your Majesty, that we will, in our several Capacities, use every Exertion to maintain and cultivate a Difposition to good Order, an Obedience to the Laws, and a Respect for the Legislature, as the best Securities of our Properties, of our Freedom, and of our Religion. The specious Pretence of a Zeal for the Rights and Interests of this Kingdom, can never induce us to give our Countenance to Acts of Violence and Outrage against the Law: Those Rights and Interests must ever be, as they ever have been, most successfully promoted, by a respectful and temperate Appeal to your Majesty's paternal and equal Regard for every Part of your Empire, and to the Wisdom and Liberality of the Parliaments of Great Britain and Ireland. With these Sentiments we have the most perfect Considence, that your Majesty, together with the Parliaments of both Kingdoms, will give a ferious and liberal Attention to the Situation of Ireland, with Regard to those Branches of her Trade and Commerce for which, from the peculiar Circumstances of the British Empire, both at Home and Abroad, no Provisions have yet been made. We have observed with Gratitude and Satisfaction, that the Importance of this Subject

has already attracted your Majesty's Notice; and we trust, that after a full Investigation of it, such Regulations will be framed, as shall be found belt calculated to promote the Wealth and the Prosperity of all the Parts of the Empire.

It is likewise enacted, that from and after the last Session of Parliament, no Letter or Packet fent by Post, within Great Britain, directed by any Member of either House of Parliament, shall be exempted from the Duty of Postage, unless the whole Superscription thereof shall be of the Handwriting of the Member, and shall have endorsed thereon, in the same Hand-writing, the Name of the Member, Post Town from whence the same is to be fent, and the Day, Month, and Year, when put into the Post Office, the Day of the Month to be in Words at length; and unless every such Letter and Packet shall be put into the General, or other Post-Office, or into a Receiving House, on the Day of the Date put upon such Letter or Packet: And no Letter or Packet directed to any fuch Member shall be exempted from the Duty of Postage, unless such as shall, during the Sitting of Parliament, or within Forty Days before, or Forty Days after any Summons or Prorogation thereof, be directed to any such Member, at the Place where he shall actually be at the Time of the Delivery thereof, or at his usual Place of Residence in London, or at the House, or Lobby of the House of Parliament, of which he is a Member.

It is further enacted, that all Persons who, by Virtue of their Offices, fend and receive Letters and Packets free of Postage, shall fend and receive them free, in the Manner, and under such Restrictions, as

any Member of Parliament.

It is also enacted, that if any Person shall forge or counterfeit the Hand-writing of any Person whatsoever, in the Superscription of any Letter or Packet, in order to avoid the Payment of Postage, or shall forge, counterfeit, or alter, or procure to be done, the Date upon such Superscription, or shall write, and send by Post, or cause to be done, any Letter or Packet, the Superscription or Cover whereof shall be forged or counterseited, or the Date thereon altered, in order to avoid the Duty of Postage, knowing the same to be forged, counterseited, or altered, every Person so offending, shall be deemed guilty of Felony, and shall be transported for Seven Years.
