Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Freeholders of the County of Meath, assembled by public Notice from the High Sheriff, at Trim, on the 1st of September, 1784, beg Leave to offer to your Majesty this humble Assurance of our stedfast Attachment to your Royal Person, Family, and Government, and to the happy Constitution of Great Britain and Ireland, under which the Protestant Religion, and the Liberties of the Subject, have together grown and flourished, and are wisely and firmly secured. Whilst we see, with Concern and Indignation, the public Peace disturbed, and the Government insulted, by the Intemperance of some misguided Persons in the City of Dublin, we are happy in declaring to your Majesty, that the Tranquillity of this County has been preserved without Interruption; and we assure your Majesty, that we will, in our several Capacities, use every Exertion to maintain and cultivate a Disposition to good Order, an Obedience to the Laws, and a Respect for the Legislature, as the best Securities of our Properties, of our Freedom, and of our Religion. The specious Pretence of a Zeal for the Rights and Interests of this Kingdom, can never induce us to give our Countenance to Acts of Violence and Outrage against the Law: Those Rights and Interests must ever be, as they ever have been, most successfully promoted, by a respectful and temperate Appeal to your Majesty's paternal and equal Regard for every Part of your Empire, and to the Wisdom and Liberality of the Parliaments of Great Britain and Ireland. With these Sentiments we have the most perfect Confidence, that your Majesty, together with the Parliaments of both Kingdoms, will give a serious and liberal Attention to the Situation of Ireland, with Regard to those Branches of her Trade and Commerce for which, from the peculiar Circumstances of the British Empire, both at Home and Abroad, no Provisions have yet been made. We have observed with Gratitude and Satisfaction, that the Importance of this Subject

has already attracted your Majesty's Notice; and we trust, that after a full Investigation of it, such Regulations will be framed, as shall be found best calculated to promote the Wealth and the Prosperity of all the Parts of the Empire.

That Letters and Packets to or from the General Post-Office in London, to or from the City of Edinburgh, Dumfries and Cockburnspath, shall pay in Addition, Single 1 d. and so in Proportion.

That Letters and Packets above one Post Stage, and not exceeding 50 Miles, within Scotland, shall pay in Addition, Single 1 d. and so in Proportion.
