befides we are fold, that they have made fo many Retrenchments within the Town, and so well fortified several houfes, that it is not believed his Electoral Highness will hazard'a general Affault as things stand at prefent, but will gain ground by degrees, and therefore I veral great Mines are preparing, and when they are finished, we shall hear of further Attacks. From Elsenore they write, that a Vessel was arrived there, who had met at Seaten Suedes Men of War, who had on board 6000 Sol lers, hich we know not what credit to give to. Here is much talk in Town that the Besiegers had made a general Affault upon Stetin, and that they were repulsed, but we must look upon it for a report onely, till we hear of it with more certainty. From Gluckstadt they write, that seven Companies of Foot were marched from thence towards Kiel, from whence

were marched from thence towards k.tel, from whence they would go on Copenhugen.

Ditto, Dec. 10. We have by Letters of the Instant advice from the Camp before Stein, That the 4 the Battery upon the salf Bullwork before the Haly Ghost Cain was similated, and did sogreat Execution in beating down the Palisadoes and Retrenchments made by the Hesieged, that the night following the Brandenburghs made an Attacque, and gained a new Post; the Besieged made three several Attempts to beat them out of it again, but succeeded not. The loss of the Brandenburghs in this Action cannot be incoffiderable, for it is said of the Besieged 70 were killed. The Besiegers are not 14000 strong.

Cologne, Decemb. 7. The Baron de Landsee the Imperial Minister, Monsieur Ham, Commissay of the Munster Troops, are at present here, as likewise the Deputies of the Elector of Treves, of the Duke of Neuburg, of the Princes of Nassaw, and of the Counts of Solms and Wieds, These have had several Conferences together to regulate the Winter-quarters alligned by the Emperor to the Duke of Neuburg, and to the Bishop of Munster in the Wetteravia, and the Westwalds, but hitherso without any effects -The above mentioned Commissary demanding quarters and maintenance for seventeen Regiments, when in reality the faid Munster Troops do not at present exceed 4000 men. In the mean time those Troops are approached the Rhine, and are at present encamped between Lins and Ardemach, in expectation of the issue of these Conserences. The Deputies of Aix la Chapelle are creturned home, that City having not been able to be persuaded to receive any Troops into their Town.

Bruffels, Decemb. 10. His Excellency the Duke de Villa Hormofa parted hence on Wednesday morning to the general Rendezvous of the Army near Hall, and encamped with it that night between Limber and Tubise; yesterday the Army marched again, and encamped between Braine le Comte and Soignies. Yesterday morning the Count de Nassaw, General of the Dutch Cavalry, passed through this City with several Regi-ments of Horse, which were quartered on the farther fide of Brabant, he purposed to join the Rear of the Army as last night. This afternoon two Dutch Regiments of Foot, who came from Breda and those parts, passed through this City towards Hall, where they are to supply the place of those which have been drawn out from thence upon this march. We have just now Let-ters from the Camp, dated at midnight, which fay, that his Excellency would decamp this morning very early, that to morrow or on Sunday at farthest, he doubted not to appear before St Guislain, of which he had fent to give the Governor an account, and to ex-Nort him by all means to defend the place till that time. From Alface they write, that the Mareschal de Grequi had possessed himself of Busmeiler, which was quitted by the Imperialists, and had put a strong Garison into it, and that he had dispersed his Troops into their Win-

ter-quarters in Lorrain and the Franche Comte. From Metz they tell us, that the Marquis de Rannes was come into those parts with a considerable errachement of Mareschai de Crequi's Army, and that great Magazines are providing insall the French places upon the Moselle, to be made use of the next Campagne.

Hague, Decembi-ra. This afternoon their Highneffes the Bringe and Princess of Orange make their publick entrance Into this place. The Burghers are in Arms to receive them, and other preparations suitable to the occasion have been made, and all will be concluded with Bonfires, Feafting, &c. in the evening. The States General have not yet performed their Gom-pliment of Congratulation, his Highness debring in might be deferred till his arrival here, with the Letters we receive from Flanders and Brabant, give us an account, that St. Guissain was taken on Friday night last, the Garison was composed of about twelve hundred men, all Duich Troops, and commanded men. The Letters from the Camp before steerin, are of the oin instant, they inform us, that the Besiegers had takent a new Polt on the Bullwork near the Holy Ghoff Gare, but with great loss of Men, and without much advancing the Siege by it.

Paris, Decemb. 15. What we have at prefent to tell you is, that on Sunday last we received an account that Si Guislain was taken on Friday night last; the Condi-

tions we as yet know not.
