To the KING's Moft Excellent Majefly.

Moß Gracious Sovereign, WE, your Majeffy's dutiful and loyal Sub-jects, the High Shorig --- C jects, the High Sheriff and Grand Jury of the County of Antrim, affembled at the Summer Affizes, 1784, most humbly intreat Permiflion to express our fincere Affection and Attachment to your Majefty's Perfon, Family and Government, and to affure your Majesty, that we feel, with a becoming Senie of Duty and Gratitude, the recent Instances of your Majesty's paternal Kindness and Attention to your faithful Subjects of Ireland, in the Reftoration of their legiflative Rights, and the Advance that is now making towards the Perfection of their Commerce : We fincerely lament that the Peace of the Metropolis has been lately difturbed by violent Outrages committed by fome of your Majesty's deluded Subjects; and while we with to express a just Indignation at such intemperate Proceedings, we are happy to inform your Majefty, that a becoming Spirit of good Order and Submiffion to the Laws has prevailed in this Part of your Kingdom: And we folemnly affure your Majefty, that we will, within our feveral Depart-ments, fupport your Majefty's Government, and the due Execution of our excellent Laws; and that we will use our utmost Endeavours in promoting that peaceable Demeanour and Spirit of Industry which are effential to the Prosperity and Happiness of the Kingdom, and which we perfuade ourfelves will be the most acceptable Teltimony of Duty and Allegiance from a free People to the beft of Kings.

That your Majefty may continue long to reign over an happy, free and loyal People, is the fervent Prayer of your Majefty's most dutiful Subjefts.
