The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HIS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, That the Parliament which stands prorogued to Tuesday the Twentieth of this instant October, should be further prorogued to Thursday the Second Day of December next.

Petersburgh, September 21. On Thursday last the Empress returned to this Capital from Czarso-Zelo for the Winter Season: Her Imperial Majesty is in perfect Health.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that, in the Night of the 6th Instant, or early in the Morning of the 7th, a Number of Armed Men, in Three Boats, with Black Crapes over their Faces, or their Faces blacked, boarded the Ship *Elbe*, bound to *Hamburg*, then lying off *New Crane*, in the *River Thames*, and, having confined the Officers and Crew, stole from on Board the said Ship Three Cases and One Case, containing Spanish Dollars to a considerable Amount, and other valuable Articles:

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this daring and atrocious Robbery, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the said Offenders, who shall discover one or more of his Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Leicester House, October 14, 1784.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Sessions of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for enabling Sir Ashton Lever to dispose of his Museum, as now exhibited at Leicester House, by Way of Chance," it is enacted, That it shall and may be lawful to and for the said Sir Ashton Lever, his Executors, Administrators and Assigns, and he and they is and are thereby authorized and empowered to sell and dispose of the said Museum, and the several Pieces composing the same, (the Drawings of Miss Sarah Stone only excepted) by Way of Chance. And it is further enacted, that the Money to be raised thereby shall not exceed the Sum of 37,800*l.* upon the Sale of the Whole of the said Museum; and that the Number of Tickets shall not exceed in the Whole 36,000; and that the said Sir Ashton Lever, his Executors, Administrators or Assigns, shall and do, on or before the 25th Day of December, 1784, and before he or they shall dispose of any Ticket, Number or Figure, under or in pursuance of the said Act, give Notice in the London Gazette, of his or their Intention to sell and dispose of the said Museum under and in pursuance of the said Act; and that the Whole of the said Museum shall constitute One Prize only; and that such Prize shall be determined by the Drawing of the First State Lottery that shall consist of 36,000 or upwards, and be drawn within this Kingdom, in pursuance of an Act or Acts of Parliament for that Purpose, between the 25th Day of September, 1785, and the 2d Day of February 1786; and that the First Ticket that shall be drawn in such State Lottery, the Number whereof shall correspond with any Number of the said Sir Ashton Lever's, his Executors, Administrators or Assigns, shall be, and is thereby declared to be, the Prize. And that in case there shall be no State Lottery drawn in this Kingdom, in pursuance of any Act or Acts of Parliament for that Purpose, between the 25th Day of September, 1785, and the 2d Day of February, 1786, that shall consist of 36,000 or upwards; and that the said Sir Ashton Lever, his Executors, Administrators or Assigns, shall have given Notice in the London Gazette as aforesaid, then it shall and may be lawful to and for the said Sir Ashton Lever, his Executors, Administrators or Assigns, and he and they are thereby authorized at any Time, after the 2d Day of February, 1786, and before the 25th of March, 1786, to put the whole Number under the Inspection, and in the Presence of the Hon. Daines Barrington, Bamber Gascoigne, jun. Esq; Thomas Stanley, Esq; John Blackburn, Esq; and Thomas Butterworth Bayley, Esq;
