THE Two following Addresses having been transmitted by his Grace the Duke of Rutland, Lord Lieutenant of the Kingdom of Ireland, to the Right Honourable Lord Sydney, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have, by his Lordship, been presented to the King: Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Foreman and Grand Jury of the Quarter Sessions, held at Killmainham, at the County of Dublin Court House, on Tuesday the 5th Day of October, 1784.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, most humbly presume to express the grateful Sentiments of our Hearts, and our inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Person, Family and Government.

Perfectly sensible of your Majesty's paternal Care of this Kingdom, we cannot, in Justice to ourselves or our Posterity, omit this seasonable Opportunity of declaring our rooted Abhorrence of every Attempt to create dangerous Discontents, tending to subvert the Constitution in Church and State.

We consider our Connection with our Sister Kingdom as the great Band of mutual Strength and Safety; and we depend upon your Majesty's gracious Declaration, and the Wisdom and Justice of the respective Legislatures of Great Britain and Ireland, that such lasting Regulations will be made upon the important Objects of Trade and Commerce as may be found best calculated to promote the Wealth and Prosperity of all your Majesty's Dominions.

Though we trust our Attachment and Fidelity cannot be doubted, yet we think it incumbent on us at this Time to renew our Expressions of Duty, Zeal and Affection; and to assure your Majesty, that we reject with Indignation the Interference of any Body of Men, assuming to themselves Powers unknown to the Laws and Constitution.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Freeholders of the County of Kerry, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with every Sentiment of Attachment and unshaken Loyalty to your Royal Person, Family, and Government, and of Gratitude for the many Blessings of Civil and Religious Liberty which we now enjoy.

Impressed with such Sentiments, we cannot but view, with much Concern, the mischievous Efforts of factious and misguided Men, to disturb the Peace and Freedom of your loyal Kingdom of Ireland. We have seen them labour, and unfortunately with too much Success, to excite the

deluded Multitude to the most daring Acts of Violence and Sedition; and, in particular, we have seen, with much Alarm, certain Persons, stiling themselves a Committee of the Aggregate Meeting of the Inhabitants of Dublin, inviting the Nation to the Election of a Congress, and, under Colour of Reforming the Constitution, endeavouring to weaken the Authority of Parliament, and set the established Government at Defiance.

We beseech your Majesty to be persuaded, that this County is not stained by Principles so subversive of all Order and Civil Society; and that we do most heartily reprobate the proposed Project of a National Congress, as a most dangerous and illegal Measure.

A Petition has been already presented, in the Name of this County, to the House of Commons, in Favour of a Parliamentary Reform; but whatever the Sentiments of a Majority of us, upon that delicate Question, may be, we all agree in thinking it a Subject to be agitated in a sober and Constitutional Manner only; and that we look to the Wisdom and Justice of our Parliament for the Adoption of such Provisions and Regulations as may be deemed wanting to obviate all Venality and Corruption in the Election of our Representatives.
