 The Address of the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, Common and Citizens of Dublin.

May it please your Grace,
WE think it right at this Time to approach your Grace with just Expressions of Respect for your Grace's personal and hereditary Virtues, whilst we declare our Satisfaction in the Firmness and Moderation of your Government.

As we sincerely lament and condemn the Outrages which have lately been committed, we beg Leave to express our humble Acknowledgements for the Readiness your Grace has discovered to co-operate in the Measures which we recommended for suppressing them.

We entertain a pleasing Hope, that, by your Grace's Interposition and Exertions, a more equal Representation of the People and such a Commercial Arrangement may be formed, as, by consulting the general Interests of the Empire, may give Stability to our Manufactures, Security to our Trade, and increase our Affection for our Sister Kingdom.

Firmly attached to our free and happy Constitution in Church and State, we feel the most satisfactory Confidence in the Fortitude of your Grace's Character; and your Grace may depend upon our Constitutional Support of every wise Measure which may be necessary to maintain the Authority of the Legislature, and the Security of the Protestant Establishment.

To his Grace the Duke of Rutland, Lord-Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland.

The humble Address of the Foreman and Grand Jury of the Quarter Sessions held at Killmainham, at the County Court-House, on Tuesday the 5th Day of October, 1784.

May it please your Grace,
WE think it our Duty to embrace this Opportunity of professing our Abhorrence of that inconsiderate Spirit of Violence and Insult which has lately disgraced a Part of this County, and we are happy in observing that the tumultuous Disposition of the People seem at length to subside, through your Grace's Firmness and Moderation.

We acknowledge, with Thankfulness, the repeated Acts of Charity and Munificence with which your Grace has relieved the Distresses of

the poor Manufacturers; and we request that your Grace's Representations to our most Gracious Sovereign, will be such as that a System of Commerce may be concerted between the Sister Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, as shall be found most conducive to the General Interests of the Public.

To the Foreman and Grand Jury of the Quarter Session of the County of Dublin.

Gentlemen,

I REQUEST you to accept my cordial Thanks for this obliging Testimony of your Approbation. I have studied to regulate my Conduct, under the Guidance of the Laws, upon Principles of Firmness and Moderation, which I feel it to be my Duty, and declare it to be my Determination, invariably to maintain, as equally essential to the Happiness of the People.

You rate too highly the Assistance which I contributed towards the Relief of the poor Manufacturers. I truly felt for those industrious Families who suffered from the Failure of the Harvest, and the Severity of the last Winter; and if I have been happy enough to alleviate their Distresses I am amply rewarded.

The earnest Wishes for the Prosperity of Ireland which I brought with me, and which have never abated, concur with my Representations to our Gracious Sovereign in Favor of such an Adjustment of Commerce between the Sister Kingdoms as shall be found most conducive to strengthen their Connection, and to promote their general Interests.
