Whitehall, December 30, 1784.

WHEREAS it has been humbly reprefented to the King, That about Seven o'Clock in the Evening of Tuesday the 30th of November last, Ed-ward Holborough, who was fined by Two of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Wilts, in the Penalty of Sixty five Pounds, for har-bouring Seventy-two Gallons of Spirits, came to the Houfe of Mr. Robert Mann, Supervifor of Excife, at Corfham, in the fame County, and paid the faid Fine: That, about Eight o'Clock the fame Evening, a Number of Ruffians came and knocked foftly at the Door of the faid Robert Mann, who was flanding in the Kitchen with the Division Officer : That, upon the Door being opened, Seven or Eight Men in Dif-guise, rushed into the House, all armed with Pistols of various Sizes, and, with horrid Imprecations, demanded the Money to be delivered up immediately, or they would blow out his the faid Supervisor's Brains; and that Five of them furrounded him with their Piftols pointed at his Head and Body : That, upon the faid Robert Mann's afking them what Money they meant, they faid, the Fine; —their own—their own: That, upon the faid Robert Mann's declaring be bad it not about him, they obliged him to fay where it was; and Four of them forced him up Stairs into his Chamber; and, upon his taking the faid Money out of his Cheft, which was in a Purfe, they pulled the Purfe from his Hands, and emptied the Money into one of their Hats, and ran down Stairs, faying to their Companions, Here it is-Here it is : That they then left the House, mounted their Horses and fired many Piftols as they rode along the Screet : That feveral respectable Neighbours came to their Doors while the Ruffians were in the said Robert Mann's Houfe, but they were obliged to go in again, the Ruffians threatening them with immediate Death if they did not.
