Cologne, Decemb. 21. The Imperial Regiment commanded by Count Serin, is within these three days come down into these Parts, and the Commissiries are at present busied to assign them Winter-quarters, our El ctor having by the late Treaty concluded with the Emperor, obliged himself to surnish Winter-quarters for 2000 men.

Bruffels, Decemb. 21. The French make great prepa. tions on all fides of us, and we have reason to believe that the Most Christian King will be in the Field in person before the end of the next month, if not prevented by the Overtyres which may be made towards a Peace. The Prince of Orange, as we are cold, hath affored his. Excellencythe Duke de Villa Hermofs, that he will not be wanting on his part to use his utmost endeavors to be very early in the Field, to oppose the progress of the Enemy. Our Letters from Cologne, and those Parts, are filled with Complaints of the Violences and Extortions of the Munfter Troops committed by them in their march, to that degree, that they become insuppor-table to the poor People. Yellerday arrived the Spanish Ordinary, we are told his Excellency received by it bills of Exchange for 300 000 Crowns, to be laid out towards the making the accessary preparations for the next Campagne, but a far greater Sum is required, to put things into the posture they ought to be, and to provide Magazines necessary for the subsistence of our Armies, which the Prince of Orange, it's faid, calls very much upon his Excellency in time to take care of.

Deito, Decemb. 24. This morning parted hence for the Hague Monsieur Dickfield, the Dutch Minister, purfiant to the Orders he had received from the States. Monsieur Chauvet, and Monsieur Louvigny, Generals of the Lurenburg and Olnabrug Troops, have not yet received the satisfaction they pretend as to the quarters, as well as subsilience to be allowed to their Troops this Winter, and we are told that they make great Complaints on this occasion. The French have drawn 2 confiderable Body of men together between the Sambie and the Meufe, with what delign we know not, unless it be to possess themselves of certain Castles about Namur, in order to their facilitating their enterprise upon ie, which, it's believed, they will besiege the next month. From Treves they write, that Count Caprara is recired with the Imperial Troops from those Parts, having only left 400 Lorrain Horse and Dragoons in Treves, and that he is marched to Deux-Ponts, which place he pretends to fortifie. That the Marquis de Rannes, who commands a detachment of the Mareschal de Crequi's Army, had taken the Castle of Sarbrucke, after three hours attack, the Garifon being made Prifoners at War, and ftript all to their Shirts, except fuch as took service with the French. The Duke of Largain, we hear, hath had a dangerous fall at Philipsburg, which will oblige him to keep his Bed for some dayes. Vienna they write, that Count Montecuculi will command the Imperial Army the next Campagne.

Amsterdam, Decemb. 14. People here are very much taken up with the appearances they persuade themselves there are of a sudden Peace. From the Hague they tell us, that his Highness the Prince of Orange has of late had several secret Conserences with the Deputies of the States; and that the state of the War is setled for the next year. In the mean time we have nothing of moment from abroad, all action ceasing everywhere, unless it be before stetin, where the Besieged give daily new proofs of their Constancy and Courage, to that degree, as to create an admiration even in their Enemies. They

tell us from several Parts, that we shall now very suddenly hear of the march of the Suedes Army, under the Command of Count Bens Horne, and that that will be quickly followed with an account of their being sallen into Prussia, which they think will oblige the Elector of Brand nburgh to raise the Siege immediately, to take care of the desence of that Country.

Hagke, Decemb. 24. On Wednestay the States of Holland separated, having passed a Resolution for the railing the 202th penny once, intending when they meet again, to have the same repeated as often as they shall see occasion. We are sold that the state of the War Is fetled for the next year, on the same foot it was the last. In the mean time People talk much of Peace, and are the more ready to believe what is faid on that Subject, because they defire to see an end of those burthens the present War layes upon them. Their Highnesses are gone this afternoon to their houfe at Soeftdike, to divert themselves there. The Besiegers at Statin advance very stowly; we have seen Letters from the Camp, which faid that the Elector of Brandenburgh feems not dispofed, for feveral confiderations, to hazard a general fform; and on the other hand it is thought, the flow paces which the Beliegers make, will cause it to be a work of time, and perhips give the Suedes an opportunity to fuccor the place, especially if it be true what they say of the much of their Army in Livenia.

Paris, Decemb. 24. We have nothing to write from hence, but of the preparations we hear are making for the opening the Campagne very early, as well on the file of Flanders, as of Germany. As to the first, the King will command his Army in Person. Monsieur Fouques, and the Count de Lauzan, who are Prisoners at Pleneral, have, at the Suit of the Chancellar, obtained permission to walk about in that Castle, and to converse with and receive Letters from their Friends, which some think may be followed with other matks of Grace. From Thoulon we have an account, that feveral Veffels are preparing there to carry Provisions to Messina, and that they will be ready to fail in a very thort time under a good Convoy. From Savoye they write of the death of the Marquis de St. Thomasa, the chief Minister at that Court.
