O prevent the Inconveniencies which have arisen from the Space before Their Majesties, which is allotted for Minuet Dancing, being ex-ceedingly crowded, it is requested that those Ladies only who mean to dance will fend for Dancers Tickets, and fit in those Places, as the Seats have been found too few to accommodate the Dancers.

Constantinople, December 10.

The contagious Diforder has again manifested itself in this Refidence, and in two Villages situated on the Canal. It is however hoped that it will be entirely eradicated by the Effects of the Winter Colds, when they commence here.

St. James's, August 28.

AS feveral Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have from Time to Time gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; The following Abstracts of Two Acts of Parliament of George the First and George the Second, to prevent such Practices, are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them.—And it will be observed, that they extend to those who are any ways concerned or infirumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Ma-nufacturers out of these Kingdoms, and in the Export-

ation of the Tools and Inftruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themfelves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Informa-tion, in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Affizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS or the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Per-fon having been once convict, shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Difcretion of the Court, and imprifoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being fuch Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majefty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the faid Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any fuch Foreign Country, exercising any of the faid Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Conful of Great Britain, in the Country where fuch Artificers shall be, or by any Perfon authorifed by fuch Ambaffador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from thenceforth inhabit within this Realm; fuch Perfon shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, and of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devife or Purchafe; and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Ule, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majefty's Protection.

Úpon Complaint made upon Oath before any Juffice of Peace that any Perfon is endeavouring to feduce any fuch Artificer, or that any fuch Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforefaid; fuch Justice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complaned of before him, or before fome other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, fuch Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Sef-fions : And if fuch Perfon shall refuse to give Security, the Juffice may commit him to Goal till the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions, and until he shall be delivered by duc Courle of Law. And if any fuch Artificer (hall be convicted upon Indictment of any fuch Promife, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purpofe aforefaid, he shall give fuch Security to the King, not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as fuch Court shall think teasonable, and shall be imprifored till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland the same shall be profecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Perfon shall contract with, or endeavour to feduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country, not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted upon Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Weftminster, or by Indictment at the Affizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein fuch Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Jufficiary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if fuch Offence be committed in Ireland; the Perfon fo convicted fhall, for every Artificer contracted with, or feduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and fhall fuffer Impri-fonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Foreiture be paid : And in Cafe of a subsequent Offence of the fame Kind, the Perfons fo again offending shall forfeit, for every Perfon contracted with or feduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall fuffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until fuch Forfeiture be paid.

If any Perfon in Great Britain or Ireland fhall put on Board any Ship or Boat not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to fome other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any fuch Tools or Utenfils as are commonly ufed in. or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufacturers or any Part of fuch Tools, he fhall for every Offence forfeit all fuch Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Wefiminiter, or in the Court of Seffion in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts, in Dublin respectively, wherein no Effoin, &c. fhall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to feize and fecure, in fome of His Majetty's Warehoufes, all fuch Tools or Utenfils prohibited to be exported, as fuch Officer shall find on Board any Vellel not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to fome other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain ; and all Tools fo feized shall, after Condemnation, be publickly fold to the bett Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Ufe of His Majefty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall feize and fecure the fame.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the faid Tools,

prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Veffel, he shall for every such Offence forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and if the Veffel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUN-DRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Cuftoms in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools, or knowingly fuffer the fame to be done, he fhall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforefaid, and alfo forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majefly.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the fame.
