Their Royal Highnesses the Princes and Princesses are also removed from Windsor and Kew to their respective Residences in Town for the Winter Season.

St. James's, January 12.

The King has been pleased to appoint Ralph Woodford, Esq; late His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of Denmark, to be His Majesty's Commissary to treat with the Commissary of the Catholick King concerning new Arrangements of Commerce, pursuant to the Definitive Treaty of Peace and Friendship, concluded between the Two Crowns at Versailles, the 2d of September, 1783.

On Thursday last Count Scabrouski, the new Minister Plenipotentiary from the Court of Russia, had a private Audience of his Sicilian Majesty to present his Credential Letters.

The Lava continues to run gently from an Opening near the Crater of Mount Vesuvius, without descending low enough to do any Damage to the fertile and cultivated Country at the Foot of the Mountain.

Vienna, January 1.

The Nobility of both Sexes, and the Foreign Ministers, had the Honour of paying their Court this Morning to the Emperor, who afterwards dined in Public.

Paris, January 4.

Letters from Briançon mention, that a Shock of an Earthquake was felt there the 9th Ult. at Ten Minutes after Nine o'Clock in the Morning. The Concussion was pretty strong, but of short Duration, attended with a rumbling Noise which resembled the Report of Cannon. There was no perceptible Vibration; but, during several Nights previous to the Shock, fiery Vapours were observed to issue from the Earth in various Parts near the Coal Mines.

St. James's, August 28.

AS several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have from Time to Time gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings; contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; The following Abstracts of Two Acts of Parliament of George the First and George the Second, to prevent such Practices, are published for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them.—And it will be observed, that they extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, and in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and shall

be

be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter-Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS or the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted, shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from thenceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Person shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, and of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise or Purchase; and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath before any Justice of Peace that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid; such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted upon Indictment of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King, not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country, not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted upon Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by

Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in Case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on Board any Ship or Boat not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working-up or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufacturers or any Part of such Tools, he shall for every Offence forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts, in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Vessel, he shall for every such Offence forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Suffrance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That, on Tuesday the 10th Day of August last, John Fisher, Commander of the Hunter Cutter, in the Service of His Majesty's Customs at the Port of Yarmouth, being on a Cruize, about Six o'Clock in the Evening, discovered a Lugger coming round Foulness, and, suspecting her to be a Smugler, gave chase, but a thick Fog coming on, lost Sight of her for a small Space of Time: That being informed the said Lugger had sailed to the Southward, he manned his Ten-oar'd Boat, under the Command of Robert Jay, his Second Mate, with Ralph Newby and Eleven others, who, soon after Day-Light in the Morning of the 11th of August aforesaid, came up with the said Lugger at Bacton Bay, on the Coast of Norfolk, and within the Limits of the Port of Yarmouth, and found her to be the Bacton Lugger, Charles Gee, Master: That on the Officers approaching the Lugger, they were fired upon by the Smuglers on board the said Lugger, which was returned by the Officers firing Two Muskets over their Heads: But that the Officers still persisting in doing their Duty, and endeavouring to board the said Lugger, the Firing from her was continued, and Charles Gee, the Master, with a Blunderbuss, pointed at the said Robert Jay, shot him through the Body, of which Wound he died in less than Half an Hour afterwards; and that at the Time the said Charles Gee fired the Blunderbuss, the Custom-House Boat was within Three or Four Yards of the Lugger.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this most atrocious Outrage and Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the said Charles Gee) who shall discover his Accomplices therein, so that Two or more of them may be apprehended and convicted of the said Offence.

And as a further Encouragement, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs do hereby promise a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons who shall apprehend and take, or cause to be apprehended and taken, the said Charles Gee, to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs upon his Conviction: And if, in consequence of such Discovery, an Apprehension, any One or more of the said Offenders shall be taken, tried, and convicted of the said Offence, the Person making such Discovery shall be entitled to the like Reward.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That about Seven o'Clock in the Evening of Tuesday the 30th of November last, Edward Holborough, who was fined by Two of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the County of Wilts, in the Penalty of Sixty-five Pounds, for bar-bowling Seventy-two Gallons of Spirits, came to the House of Mr. Robert Mann, Supervisor of Excise, at Corsham, in the same County, and paid the said Fine: That, about Eight o'Clock the same Evening, a Number of Ruffians came and knocked justly at the Door of the said Robert Mann, who was standing in the Kitchen with the Division Officer: That, upon the Door being opened, Seven or Eight Men in Disguise, rushed into the House, all armed with Pistols of various Sizes, and, with horrid Imprecations,

demanding the Money to be delivered up immediately, or they would blow out his the said Supervisor's Brains; and that Five of them surrounded him with their Pistols pointed at his Head and Body: That, upon the said Robert Mann's asking them what Money they meant, they said, the Fine;—their own—their own: That, upon the said Robert Mann's declaring he had it not about him, they obliged him to say where it was; and Four of them forced him up Stairs into his Chamber; and, upon his taking the said Money out of his Chest, which was in a Purse, they pulled the Purse from his Hands, and emptied the Money into one of their Hats, and ran down Stairs, saying to their Companions, Here it is—Here it is: That they then left the House, mounted their Horses and fired many Pistols as they rode along the Street: That several respectable Neighbours came to their Doors while the Ruffians were in the said Robert Mann's House, but they were obliged to go in again, the Ruffians threatening them with immediate Death if they did not.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the most daring Outrage and Robbery above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of the said Persons, who will discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
