Then, by the Sovereign's Command, Lieutenant-General Boyd was introduced into the Presence by Sir Hector Munro, the Junior Knight present, preceded by the Gentleman-Usher of the Order, with Reverences as before.

The Sword of State was delivered to the Sovereign by Lord Amherst, the Second Knight in Seniority, and Lieutenant-General Boyd kneeling, was knighted therewith. Then Sir Joseph Yorke, the Senior Knight, presented the Ribbon and Badge to the Sovereign, and His Majesty put them over the new Knight's Right Shoulder, who being thus invested, and having kissed His Majesty's Hand, the Procession returned to the Privy Chamber in the Order above mentioned, Sir Robert Boyd, the new Knight, preceding.

The Ceremony was performed in His Majesty's Closet, several Great Officers of the Court being present.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Ireland, in Parliament assembled, embrace with unfeigned Satisfaction this Opportunity of repeating our Sentiments of zealous and affectionate Attachment to your Royal Person and Government.

We gratefully acknowledge your Majesty's Goodness in having placed over us a Chief Governor whose private Virtues entitle him to the Esteem and Regard of this House, and whose experienced Moderation and Firmness peculiarly qualify him in the present Circumstances of the Kingdom for so distinguished a Trust.

Your Majesty may rely upon the Zeal of your faithful Commons to grant such Supplies as may be suitable to the Exigencies of the State, the Interests of your People, and the liberal Support of your Majesty's Government.

We return your Majesty our sincere Thanks for graciously recommending to our diligent Attention the final Adjustment of Commercial Objects with our Sister Kingdom, deeply penetrated with your Majesty's paternal Regard, manifesting an equal Interest in the Prosperity of your People, we shall consider the Advantages of every Part of the Empire as the true Basis of such an Adjustment; and as a Settlement arranged upon these equitable Principles must give universal Satisfaction, and its Advantages, in order to be substantial, must be lasting. Whilst we declare our Abhorrence of such lawless and unconstitutional Proceedings, your Majesty may confide in our strenuous and constant Endeavours to prevent their pernicious Effects, as well by our individual Influence as by our collective Exertions.

The Agriculture, Manufactures, and Fisheries of this Kingdom, those abundant Sources of Industry, Wealth and Population, shall be the constant Objects of our earnest Care.

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled, return your Grace our most humble Thanks for your excellent Speech from the Throne.

With the strongest Impressions of Gratitude to His Majesty, we acknowledge His paternal Goodness and Attention in His Appointment of your Grace to the Government of this Kingdom.

Every Precaution is seriously employed here to keep off the Plague, which by the latest Accounts rages at present at Tunis, and its Environs, with as much Violence as if it had declared itself in the Midst of Summer. According to those Accounts no less than Thirty-two Thousand People have been already carried off by this Calamity.

The Earthquakes, which had ceased Calabria and Sicily for some Weeks, have again been sensibly felt, and prove a great Discouragement to the Operations carrying on for the Benefit of those afflicted Countries, particularly at Messina, which has been declared a free Port, and where the Buildings were actually begun.
