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Naples, Novemb. 23.

**O**UR Viceoy the Marquis de los Voles, having directed the Governors and Commanders in the several places and strong holds within this Kingdom, to send him a particular account of what they find wanting in their respective Governments; and having accordingly received the same, several extraordinary Councils have been held for these dayes past, to examine the said accounts, and to give such Orders thereupon as shall be found necessary, and besides the Viceoy has charged himself to represent matters to the Court of Spain, in order to be supplied from thence. From Reggio they write, that several persons had been apprehended there, and, among others, the Count de Policastra, for supplying the Messineses with Corn.

Genoua, Decem. 10. The 2d instant arrived here the Ship, John Bohemham Commander, from Trapani and Palermo who brings not any News of moment from those Parts. Two dayes since sailed from hence the Arms of England, and the Fountain, for Legorn; and the Continuation, for Palermo and Tarantia; and yesterday followed the Concord, and the Golden Fleeco, for Legorn; where we understand are arrived four French Men of War, and several Barks, part of a great Fleet returning from Messina to Thoulon. The Margarete, Thomas Hurlocke Master, is this afternoon come in from Trapani and Palermo; and this States Convoy is under Still for Spain, consisting in one Man of War, and seven Merchant-ships, most of them of very good force.

Ditto, Decemb. 15. The 11 instant arrived here the Marygold, Edward Matthews Master, from Cadix; the Tygre, Henry Staples; the Exchange, Roger Martin; and the Providence, Samuel Green, from Amsterdam. The Friendship, Thomas Thomns, from London; the Samuel and Henry, Roger Paxton; from London; and the John and Francis, from Hull. These Ships came together from Alicante the 25th past, leaving there Sir John Narborough, who was going over for Argier with 10 Frigats. Twelve or 14 Sail of English Ships are past by for Legorn, under Convoy of the James Frigar.

Stockholme, Novemb. 26. Count Henry Horne is marching with 4000 men towards Fempterland, where he expects to be joined with 6000 of the Countrey Militia. We had Letters yesterday from those Parts, which said that the Danes, upon the News they received of this march, immediately retired, and that with so much haste and disorder, that they left several pieces of Cannon, and a great quantity of Ammunition and Provisions behind them, which they threw into the water, upon their passing over a certain River, in which several Soldiers were drowned, who were thrown into it by their Companions, who pressed upon one another; as if the Enemy had been at their heels.

Vienna, Decemb. 16. The tenth man is raising throughout the Emperors Hereditary Countries, pursuant to what had been resolved in the late Assembly of the States, who being formed into a Body, will be em-

ployed against the Rebels in Hungary, who, we are informed, sollicite very earnestly by their Agents at the Port, and in the Court of the Prince of Transylvania, to be succoured from thence, but hitherto with small effect; the Grand Signior remaining constant in his resolution, to observe with all exactness on his part the peace and good correspondence at present establish'd between the two Empires. The Prince of Eggenberg, Governour of Carinthia, is arrived at Court, and has given the Emperor an account of the posture of things there. We are certainly informed that the Empress is gone several months with Child, which occasions no small joy at Court. In our last we told you, that we had an account from Hungary, that the Rebels had passed the Reysse; and were marched towards Nagybania; since we understand, that General Cobs, upon News of it, had sent a detachment towards Tockay on the said River, to observe their motions, and purposed to follow himself with the rest of his Troops.

Dantzick, Decemb. 20. All the News of these Parts is, that the Swedes Army in Livonia is on its march; and we have Letters from Coningsberg dated yesterday, which say, that the Swedes, to secure a passage for their Army through Courland, had, on the 15 instant, possessed themselves of Mitaw, which is about seven Leagues from Riga; we do not hear that they had made any attempt upon the Castle there, where the Duke of Courland resides. People speak very variously concerning the Force of the Swedes; some tell us, that their Army consists in 15 or 16000 men, and that they expect other Troops raised in the Polish Territories to join with them; while others again will not allow them to be 10000 strong; but whatever their strength is, the Swedes themselves that are here, seem to apprehend they will come too late to relieve Stetin; for though the Besieged do all that can be expected from the most brave and resolute, yet it is impossible they should be able to hold out much longer, considering how much they must of necessity be weakened by the several losses they have sustained during the Siege.

Ribnitz, Decemb. 21. The account we have from the Camp before Stetin, is, That on the 18 instant the Besiegers sprung two great Mines, which did great execution, and made not only a breach in the first wall, but likewise in the stone wall, so that one might see the Streets of the Town, which was followed with an attack by 200 men, who, after a sharp dispute, in which the Officer that commanded them was killed, and about 80 common Soldiers killed and wounded, were repulsed. The following Night the Besieged filled up the breach in the stone wall, and made several retrenchments within. The next day the Elector of Brandenburg caused another attack to be made, in which the Besiegers succeeded, and posted themselves. We are told that his Electoral Highness has again offered the Besieged a very favorable and advantageous Capitulation, and an assurance that he will confirm to them all the Privileges accorded them by the King of Sweden, and even add more to them; but that the Besieged have not accepted them, declaring that they will never be induced

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
