AS several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, bave from Time to Time gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Lows of these Kingdomes. The following Abstracts of Two Acts of Parliament of George the First and George the Second, to prevent such Pradicts, are published for the Information of all Person who may be signorant of the Pendices they may incur by Disobedience to them.—And it will be observed, that they extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Engicing Artificers or Manusaturers out of these Kingdoms; and in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manusaturers themselves.

Statute 5. George I. Chap. 27: IF any Perfor fhall contract with, entice, or folicit; any Artificer in Wool, Iron; Steel, Brafs, or other Metal; Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any

other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign | at Dublin, if fuch Offence be committed in Ire. :Countries, out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof upon Indictment or Information, in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Affizes or Quarter-Seffions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS or the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Perfon having been once convict, hall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and im-, prisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be _paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Maiesty's Dominions, to exercise or reach the said Frades to Foreigners; and it any of the King's Subjects in any fuch Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister or Consul of Great Brirain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, . &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from thenceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Person thall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, and of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devife or Purchase; and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's ·Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His

Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made upon Oath before any Justice of Peace that any Person is endeavour-ing to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted, or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes afore-faid; such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complaned of before him, or before fome other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of one Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affices or Quarter Ses-Sons: And if such Person shall resule to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Goal till the next Assizes of Quarter Sessions, and until he shall -he delivered by due Course of Law. And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted upon Indictment of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas for the Purpole aforefaid, he shall give such Security to the King, not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security givên.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed sin Scotland the same shall be prosecuted in the «Court of Justiciary, or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artisteer in Wool, Mohair, Cotston or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or cany other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland, into any Foreign Country, nor within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted upon In-dictinent or Information in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assisses or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Juliciary, or any of the Circuit Courts in Spotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench

land; the Person so convicted stall, for every Artificer contracted with, or seduced, sorfely FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Impriforment in the Common Goal of the County or Stewartry, wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Poreiture: be paid: And in Cafe of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forseit, for every Person contracted with or-seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaolof the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offendershall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such-Forfeiture be paid

If any Person in Great Britain er Ireland shall pur on Board any Ship or Boat not bound directly to fome Port in Great Britain or Iroland, or to fome. other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utenfils as are commonly rain, any such tools of Utentits as are commonly used in or proper for the Preparing, Working up or Pinishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufacturers or any Part of such Tools, he shall for every Offence forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, pur on Board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Seffion in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts. in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue. in Ireland, to leize and lecure, inflome of His Majesty's Warehouses, all-such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on Board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools to feized shall, after Condemnation, be publickly fold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty. and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize

and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on Board his Wessel, he shall for every such Offence forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS; to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Perfors exporting the Tools; and if the Vellel belongs to His Majelly, the Captain stall not only forfeit ONE HUN-DRED POUNDS, but shall allo forfeit his Em-ployment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty

If any Officer of the Cultoms in Great Britain, or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly fuffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or fign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the faid Tools; or knowingly fuffer the fame to be done; he shall forfelt ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office

under His Majesty.
