WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That about Twelve o'Clock in the Night of the 21st of January last, Two Men called at the Lodgings of James Ivey and John Thompson, Officers of Excise at Leatherhead in Surry, and, under the Pretence that they were the Assistants of another Revenue Officer, and in Pursuit of some Smugglers, they enticed the said James Ivey out, immediately after which he was surrounded by a large Party of Ruffians, supposed to be Smugglers, who beat him in so cruel a Manner as to endanger his Life:

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in assaulting and beating the said James Ivey, as above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any of them who shall discover his Accomplices therein, so that they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That on Monday Evening last, between Seven and Eight o'Clock, the House of Mrs. Elizabeth Abercromby, in Charlotte-street, Rathbone-place, was entered by Six Men and a Boy, some of them disguised with Crapes over the lower Part of their Faces, and armed with Pistols and Cutlasses, who, on the Door being opened, rushed in, tied her and her Maid Servant, and plundered the House of the following Things, viz. a Gold Watch, Maker's Name "Tompkins," in a Green Case, (and not a silver gilt Watch, as mentioned in Two former Advertisements;) a Pair of large Silver Sauce-Boats; a Pair of Lady's handsome Stone Shoe Buckles; several Pair of Gentleman's Lace Ruffles, Lace Robbins, and Tuckers; a Gentleman's Ring, with a Ship in the Middle, set round with Brilliants; a Pair of Paste Ear-Rings; a Pair of Gold Wires; sundry China Trinkets; a Silver Castor Stand and Castor Tops; Six Table Spoons marked with a Crest, a Bez, and the Motto "Vive et Vitas;" Six Tea Spoons, and a Pair of Tea Tongs, not marked; a Punch Ladle and a Strainer; a Gold Watch, capped and jewelled, the outside Case enamelled blue, representing a dancing Girl, Steel Chain, Maker's Name "Tregent," (and not a Lady's Gold Watch, with a green Shagreen Case, Maker's Name "Tompkins," as before inserted) with a gold Hook and Key, and

Three Seals, one a Capid; Two Indian Shawls, one a Handkerchief Shawl, the other a long damson-coloured Shawl with a Green Border; and various Articles of Wearing Apparel; Twelve Yards of Fawn-coloured Sattin; Twelve Yards of Lead-coloured Ditto; an Arm-hole Cloak, Figured Lilac Sattin, trimmed with dark Fur; a Ditto black Mode, trimmed with Lace; and a Wrap Ditto, trimmed with fine Lace and Edging:

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Burglary and Robbery, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplices therein, so that they or any one of them shall be apprehended and convicted thereof.

SUNDAY TOLL.

THE Commissioners appointed to carry into Execution an Act of Parliament passed in the Eleventh Year of His present Majesty's Reign, for consolidating, &c. the several Acts of Parliament for Paving, Cleansing, and Lighting the City of London and Liberties thereof; do hereby give Notice, that they will meet in the Council Chamber of the Guildhall, on Tuesday the 1st Day of March next, at Four o'Clock in the Afternoon, to let, by public Auction, a Lease for One Year from Lady-Day next, of the Tolls directed by the said Act to be paid before any Cattle or Carriage shall be permitted to pass on a Sunday through any or either of the Turnpikes hereafter mentioned, or through any Turnpike to be erected by Virtue of the said Act, or any other Act or Acts of Parliament near the same, viz.

- The Turnpike at Mile End.
- The Turnpike at Bethnal Green.
- The Turnpike at Hackney.
- The Turnpike at Kingsland.
- The Turnpike at Ball's Pound or Pond, Islington.
- The Turnpike at Holloway.
- The Turnpike at the End of St. John's-Street.
- The Turnpike at the End of Goswell-Street, and
- The Turnpike on the New Road, commonly called the City Road;

(that is to say) for every Coach, Chariot, Berlin, Chaise, Chair, Calash, or other Carriage drawn by Six or more Horses or Mules, the Sum of Ten-pence: For every Coach, Chariot, Berlin, Chaise, Chair, Calash, or other Carriage, drawn by Four Horses or Mules, the Sum of Eight-pence: For every Coach, Chariot, Berlin, Chaise, Chair, Calash or other Carriage, drawn by Three or Two Horses or Mules, the Sum of Six-pence: For every Chaise, Chair, Calash, or other Carriage, drawn by One Horse or Mule, the Sum of Three-pence: And for Horse, Mule or Ass, not drawing, the Sum of One Penny, subject nevertheless to the Provision by the said Act, that Persons shall not be liable to the Payment of the said Tolls, more than once a Day for passing or repassing with the same Cattle and Carriage.

N. B. The Lessee is to pay one Quarter in Advance, before the Execution of the Lease; and also to continue to pay one Quarter in Advance during the Term of the said Lease.
