Whitehall, March 19, 1785.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That a Written Paper, purporting to be the Last Will and Testament of the late Lieutenant-General Jordan Wren, deceased, bearing Date the 29th Day of October, 1783, signed with his Name, and with the Names of Edward Bayley and Samuel Head as Witnesser, away found in the Area of General Robins Witnesses, was found in the Area of General Robinfon's House in Great Marlborough-street, on the 29th of March last, between the Hours of Eight and Nine Clock in the Evening, where it had been thrown by by some Person or Persons unknown, and that there is great Reason to believe that the said Will is in every Respect a Forgery, the pretended Witnesses thereto never having appeared to prove the same:

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in forging the said Will, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the Name of the said Lieutenant-General Jordan Wren thereto) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Forgery, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a further Encouragement, the Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS is hereby offered to any Person making such Discovery as abovementioned (except as before excepted) to be paid upon Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders, by John Ridout, Eltham, Kent.

THE Post-Boy bringing the Mail to this Office from Kingston was stopped near to the Bald Facea Stag Alehouse adjoining to Wimbledon Common, between Four and Five o'Clock this Morning, by Two Men on Foot, who broke open the Cart, and took away the Mail containing the following Bags, viz.

Portsmouth, Godalmin, Kingston, Haflemere, Esher, Petersfield, Chichester, Midhurst, Farnham Arundel, Ripley, Havant, Guildford, Petworth, Cobham.

One of the Persons who committed this Robbery is described to be about Fifty Years of Age, Five Feet Nine or Ten Inches high, lusty made; his Hair grey, which he wears hanging upon his Shoulders, smooth Face, and is supposed to be dressed in a blue Surtout

The other Person is about Thirty-fix Years of Age, Five Feet Six or Seven Inches high, thin made, his Face red, wears his own Hair, and is supposed to be dressed in a dark-coloured Coat. They had both the Appearance of Farmers, and were seen in London the Ewening of the Robbery.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, both or either of the Persons who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Re-ward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Persons whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery or knowing thercof, shall make Discovery whereby both or either of the Persons who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of both or either of the Parties, be entitled to the same Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most Gracious Pardon.
