Hamburg, Decemb. 31. He Articles for the furrender of Stetin having been signed, as we told you in our latt, his Electoral Highness made his Entry into the place the 26th instant. He found there a very fine Train of Artillery. It seems the Besieged wanted Powder, Salt, and Wood, which obliged them to come to a Treaty. However they obtained vesy honourable Conditions.

> Capitulation for the Surrender of Stetin, December 26. 1677.

I. The Garison both Horse and Foot, so far as it confifts of the Suedish Nation, and of Persons there-20 belonging, shall, according to Military Custom, march out with Colors flying, Drums beating, compleatly Armed, Big and Baggage, and finall be convoyed se Livonia. The Germans as well Officers as So'diers, fiell, pursuant to the Ayocatoria, quit the Suedes Service.

II. In case they cannot take all their Bazgage with them, they may commit the same to the care of some Friend, and fetch it away when the Water is

III. The Schutzen and Hey-ruyters are pardoned, except these, who contrary to Military Pra-Hice, have committed any Murthers.

IV. The Sick and Wounded may remain there till they are well, and be accommodated according to their

V. The Garison that marches out, shall take with them Provisions for one day, and afterwards shall be provided for by his Electoral Highnels.

VI. The Prisoners shall be set at Liberty. VII. The Deserters are pardoned, and must resurn to their Regiments.

VIII. His Electoral Highness grants Lieutenant General Wulften two pieces of Cannon, which he may

XVIII. In like manner all the other Churches, Communities, Schools, Hospitalt, in and without the

XIX. All the respective Preachers, those that belong to Churches and Schools, are taken by his Electoral Highness into his projection, they remaining in their Employments, without being questioned for what is pift, provided they pay all difful obedience and Fidelity to his Elestoral Hi, bne fs.

XX. The A. counts of the himbers of Accounts and Rests, as ligewife of the Store-house, after Copies ta-

ken, shill be d livered up.

XXI The Council and Burgerschop of this City Shall keep their Governmenr and Priviledges, and half not be burthened with Plundering, Contributions, or Ranfon ing of their Be'ls, a l that's past being by the Annestic wholly forgetten, and every one has liberty to go whither he will, the Burghers and Inhabitants femaining in the full possession of their Goods. XXII. The Lieutenant-General shatt fitthfully

deliver up all the Cannon, Ammunition, Provisions,

and whatever belongs to the Militia.

XXIII. Immediately after the concluding of this Accord, the new Gate, together with the Bulwork lying before the same, as likewise the Lalitdie, shall be delivered up to his Eleforal Highness.

XXIV. This Accord shall be inviolably observed and

executed in all its Points.

Vienna, Decemb. 19. We are told that the marriage between the Duke of Lorrain and the Queen Dowager of Po'and, will be celebrated the 25th of the next month at Neuftadt. From Hungary we have an account, that the Rebels have now got feveral pieces of Cannon with them, which encouraged them to atrack Beffermin, of which mention was made in our last, but they were repulsed with confiderable loss. Levies are making throughout all the Emperors Hereditary Countreys, for the recruiting the Troops against the next Campágne.

Genuos, Decemb. 22. The Lyon, Samuel Hawkes Maker, bound hither from amfterdam, and given for loft, is fafely arrived at Leghorne, having been two months at the Isles of Majorewand Minorca to repair. We hear nothing of moment from Sicily. It is reported that 6000 French Horse are on their march to Pignatel.

Strasburg, Decemb. 27. We have it confirmed that the French are preparing a great number of Imall Vessels at Briste, which they intend to carry to Hunningen; to lay a Bridge there over the Rhine; for the passage of a Body of men, who are already on their march thicker.

Eglogne, Decemb. 31. Our Magistrates continue by } their Deputies at the Court at Vicana, to follicite a discharge from paying the Moneys demanded by the Imperial Commillary here, towards the sublistence of the Imperial Troops this Win er; at the same time our faid Magistrates have declared to the Imperial Minister the Baron de l'andzee; that they thought they ought rather to employ that money for their own security in reinforcing their Garison, and adding some new Fortisications to the City. From Cleves we have advice of a great Fire that hath happened there, and that the Palace had received great damage thereby.

Amsterdam, fan. 4. The Letters we receive from

Brabant, and those parts, freak of nothing, fave of the great preparations made by the French for an early Campagne; and they affure us, that the Most Christian King will be in the Field in person before the middle of this month; That the Duke de Filla Hermofa Governor of the Spanish Netherlands, has taken care to reinforce the Garisons of Mons and Namur, and to put those places into a condition which may enable them to make a good defence in case they are attacked. States General have published a Placaer, in which, after having taken notice that the Creeks, Havens, and Inland Waters of these Countreys, are very much insested by French Capers, they declare, that if for the (u;ure any fuch Privateers or other Veffels, failing with a French Commission, shall come within the said Hawens and Inland Waters to take of plunder any Ship or Vessel, and that they be taken there, such persons as shall be found on board, shall without any favor or connivences be punished with death, His Highness the Prince of Orange has likewise caused an Order to be published, commanding all Soldiers to be in their quarters by nine a clock at night, on pain of death upon fuch as are found abroad after that hour, without leave first obtained from their Officer. The 26th past a Brandenburg Garison took possession of sterin, and the next day his Electoral Highness was to make his publick Entry there. The Men of War deligned for the Mediterranean are not yet ready.

Hague, Jan. 4. From Germany we have advice, phat the Mareschal de Grequi will very suddenly begin his march, in order to his falling into Luxemburg; and at the same time from Bruffells they tell us, that they expected the Most Christian King would be at the head of his Army in Flanders before the end of this month; upon which, it's faid, his Highness has given orders, for several Regiments, who were in their Winter-quarters in these Provinces, to march towards Brahang, whither his Highness will go himself so soon as

the Enemy begins to move.

Bruffells, Jan. 4. On Saturday the Prince of Vandement entred Mons with 200 Horse, being accompa--niedwith Count de Brougy, and several other persons of quality, who are defirous to fignalize themselves, if that City be besieged. We are rold that there is at prefent a Garison of 9000 men in it 3 and besides, the place is will provided with Victuals and Ammunition. The Garison of Namur has been likewise reinsorced with three Battalions of the Prince of Grange's Army, and the Marquis Qrillie is going thither, to affift the Governor the Brince of Barbanzon, in case of a Siege. But the French feem rather to have their eye towards Elanders; they having already a confiderable Body of Men in that Province; a short time will certainly discover what their delignage, for all our advices affore us that the King will be very fuddenly at the head of his Army. His Excellency the Duke de Killa Hermofa has ordered the Lali Paffengers thall be duly tended.

Marquis de Conflans to visit the places in Flanders, and afterwards to put himself into Ipres. The last night the French gave an alarum to the Governor of Hall, who fent an Express hither to give his Excellency an accounts that 2000 Horse and Dragoons were come to Braise le Comre, but fince we understand that they are retired again. Monsieur Dickfeild the Dutch Minister is not yet returned from the Hague, but daily expected. The Marquis de Morbec having quitted this service, is retired to his Estate within the French Conquests, and the Marquis de Molembre has also quicted his Regimenr. The Spanish Ordinary, as we are cold, has brought Bills of Exchange for 100000 Crowns for his Excellency, and 500000 for the Emperor.
