**T**HIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Mr. Quarne, Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

*An Act for appointing and enabling Commissioners further to examine, take, and state the Public Accounts of the Kingdom.*

*An Act to prohibit, for a limited Time, the Exportation of Hay.*

*An Act to enable the Mayor and Commonalty and Citizens of the City of London to pull down The Poultry and Wood-Street Compters, and to purchase certain Ground and Buildings within the said City for the Purpose of rebuilding the same.*

*An Act to explain and amend the several Acts made in this Kingdom to encourage the Building of Houses, and making other Improvements on Church Lands; and for other Purposes.*

*An Act for preventing vexatious Injunctions to stay Proceedings at Law, and for giving Costs to Defendants in Courts of Equity in certain Cases.*

Constantinople, June 25.

Letters from Smirna of the 18th Instant advise, that all Apprehensions with regard to the Plague had happily ceased in that City. Here however the Contagion continues to spread, and the Mortality, it is to be feared, will be considerable.

Stockholm, July 1.

Last Monday, at Nine o'Clock in the Morning, His Swedish Majesty arrived here in perfect Health from Finland. In the Afternoon His Majesty repaired to the Camp formed in the Park near this City, where he remained during the Manœuvres of the Troops, which ended Yesterday by a general Review. The Camp breaks up To-day, and the King at the Head of His Guards, and the other Regiments that composed it, returns into Town with the usual Pomp and Ceremony.

Hamburg, July 19.

Prince Peter of Holstein-Gottorp, now Bishop of Lubeck, arrived last Sunday Se'nnight at Oldenbourg, being declared reigning Administrator of that Dutchy; and he has since received the Oath of Allegiance from the different Dep artments and the Military.
